JACOB FORNEY

Jacob Forney was a pioneer settler of Tryon county, now Lincoln county, N. C. He was born about 1721 and was the son of a Huguenot. At the revocation of the Edict of Nantes in 1685 his father left France and settled in Alsace on the Rhine. After the death of his father, he went to Amsterdam in Holland and later came to America. He married Maria Bergner a native of Switzerland. He settled in North Carolina about 1754.

Jacob Forney and wife were the parents of Christina who married David Abernethy and Susan who married John D. Abernethy.

General Peter Forney was a son of Jacob Forney and wife. He married Nancy a daughter of David Abernethy of Lincoln county. Susan

Forney was a daughter of General Peter Forney and wife. She married Bartlett Shipp a lawyer of Lincoln county. Bartlett Shipp who married Susan Forney was an able lawyer and died in 1869. His daughter married William Preston Bynum who was an able lawyer and was a leader among the Whig people in Lincoln county and Catawba in his day. He often spent the night at my father's home when on his way to Morganton to attend court. This was before there was a railroad to Morganton. My father was a Whig in politics and was a great admirer of Judge Bynum.

Fritz Leiber Will Present Shylock Part

A lively interest is being manifested among local playgoers in reports emanating from New York concerning Fritz Leiber's presentation of Shylock, the Jew, in the "Merchant of Venice." He will present this play with his great company Saturday night at the City auditorium.

According to critics who have seen the portrayal of Shylock, Mr. Leiber makes of the Venetian money lender quite another figure than that seen heretofore in the theatre. He somehow divests Shylock of the harsh vindictive spirit commonly attributed to this striking character and rather makes of him a normal human being.

The presentation is the tale of the rise and fall of Shylock, the profiteer, who centuries ahead of his time became a victim of over-legislation and ended his career railing at what might now be called a sort of income tax.

The role of Shylock, calls forth all the star's strength and ability as a character actor. And it is said that Mr. Leiber's character portrayal of Shylock with its dignity of blending in humor and pathos, is one of the best things that he does.

The "Merchant of Venice" affords a fine presentation for both fun and character study. It is considered by many to be the best comedy ever conceived.

Mr. Leiber's supporting cast for this piece is said to be exceptionally strong. Miss Olive Oliver lends beauty and convincing heroics to the role of Portia, the lady lawyer. Louis Leon Hall is gallant and handsome and is said to make an admirable lover. Robert Strauss is said to be riotously funny as Launcelot Gobbo.

Fritz Leiber has begun his annual transcontinental tour. His visit to this city is announced for next Saturday night city auditorium. He has appeared throughout the south prominently as an exponent of the classic drama on several occasions and has won widespread popularity among local drama lovers.

After a flying trip through the south Leiber and company will make their annual bow before Manhattan audiences at the Lexington Theatre, New York City. Here it was that Leiber astonished Gotham with his spectacular engagement in that play house last season. Following New York it is planned to cross the continent with stops at the greater cities along the way.

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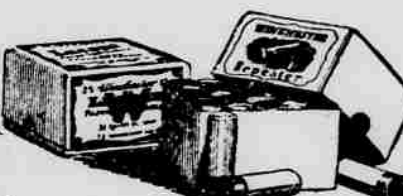
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
