HOPES MORRISON WILL SEE LIGHT

Rockingham, Dec. 19.—Rev. Oscar Haywood of Montgomery county and New York, made an address in the courthouse here Saturday afternoon in advocacy of the Ku Klux Klan. He referred to the address made by certain governors of the Klan, and asserted that the Klan in order to win the support of Catholic and Jewish voters. He stated that Governor Morrison is making an effort to be fair to the Klan, but that in some respects he sympathizes with the governor of Kansas. However, he assured the packed courthouse, Governor Morrison will finally get the light.

Rev. M. Haywood was introduced by J. L. Hawley, superintendent of the Rockingham railroad. He was interrupted by ex-Senator W. L. Parsons, who inquired as to whether he is a member of the Ku Klux Klan. Mr. Haywood answered "Yes." Mr. Parsons then asked him if he hadn't made a sworn affidavit in superior court in October that he was not a Ku Klux. Mr. Haywood replied that he had made an affidavit that he was not a knight of the Ku Klux Klan—whit emphasis on the "knight."

Mr. Parsons immediately left the court room, stating that he did not care to hear an address under any such circumstances. Referring to the recent New York incident, Dr. Haywood exhibited a letter purporting to be signed by a leader of 600 negro gunmen in New York, stating that they intended shooting hell out of him on sight. He said there were only three preachers in New York honest and bold enough to come to his defense, and there were Dr. Hills, Dr. Wilkin, the pastor of Rockefeller's church and Rector Canon Chase.

He spoke at some length on the effort of the Klan to have every state enact a law prohibiting intermarriage of the races, and to restrict immigration and curb the power of the Jews and Catholics.

He said the Ku Klux Klan stood for law and order, and that he had positive evidence that the Knights of Columbus do wear masks, this last in answer to the criticism of the Klansmen being masked. It is understood there are fully 300 Klansmen in Richmond county.

ROUGH WEATHER IS REPORTED ON WAY

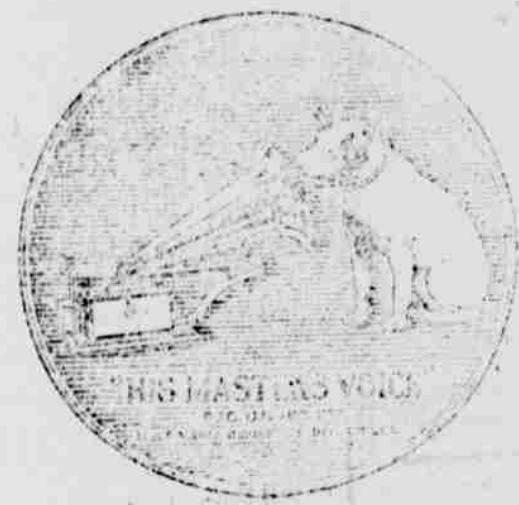
PHILIPPINE SENATE SPEAKER RANKS SECOND

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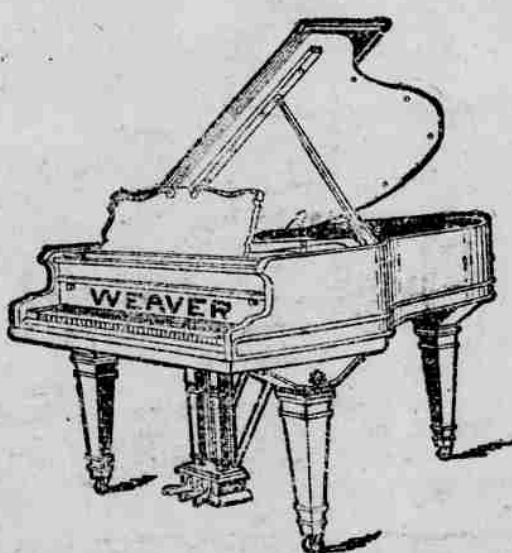
