

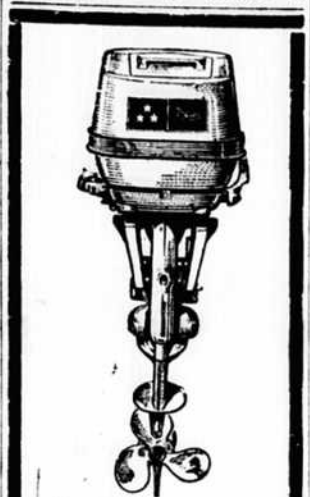
## "Rebels" Retake Fort Fisher

More than 75 "unreconstructed rebels" will participate in a gala Fourth of July celebration at Fort Fisher it was announced today by Norman C. Larson, Executive Secretary of the North Carolina Confederate Centennial Commission.



Included in this number will be members of the 6th North Carolina Infantry Regiment, Burlington; 10th North Carolina Artillery, Washington; Church's Battery, Fayetteville; Church's Battery, Winston-Salem; Norfolk Light Artillery and Portsmouth Light Artillery. Also appearing on the program will be the 26th Regimental Band (Moravian) of Winston-Salem.

Artillery pieces on display, and seen in action, will be three 12 pound Napoleons, one four pound field piece, one Howitzer and a mortar. All are illustrative of the type of artillery which saw service in

Shoulder weapons, some forty strong, will be displayed by the 6th North Carolina Regiment and will include virtually every type of musket or rifle carried by Confederate soldiers during the Civil War. The program which will commemorate the one-hundredth anniversary of Colonel William Lamb's assuming command of Fort Fisher on July 4, 1862, will be in the form of an "old fashioned" Fourth of July. Events will begin at precisely 4:30 p. m. and will conclude with a mammoth fireworks display at approximately 8:15 p. m.

Among the featured speakers are Mr. Edmund Harding of Washington, North Carolina, and Dr. James I. Robertson, Executive Director of the National Civil War Centennial Commission.

A barbeque supper will be served at a nominal charge to those desiring this service.

The program is being sponsored by the State Department of Archives and History, New Hanover County and the New Hanover County Centennial Committee in conjunction with the North Carolina Confederate Centennial Commission. The public is cordially invited to attend.

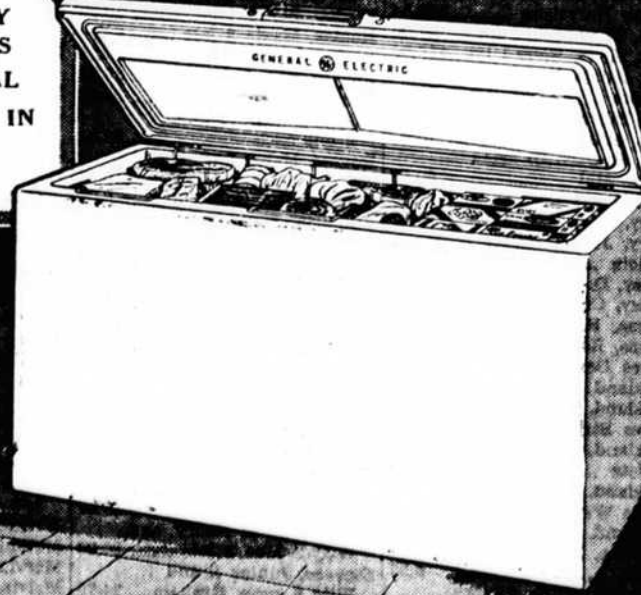
