The phonograph was operated by Theo-dore Wangeman and an assistant, who are connected with the Edison labora-tory. Eighteen cylinders were used, and the portions of speeches which were taken occupied nearly two hours. Each cylinder would last about seven minutes, and then it had to be replaced with a new one. There was a slight break caused by the changing of the cylinders, but this difficulty can easily be obviated in eight seconds.

The phonograph was put in operation, and the reporter, by putting the tubes to his ears, heard the peroration of ex-Sen-ator Winfield's speech. "Protection! Protection! Pcotection

for monopolies and trusts!" said the phonograph. It sounded as though we were sitting in a large hall close by the platform and listening to a speaker of deep, sonorous voice of extraordinary power. So real did it seem that one was surprised not to see the orator whose vehement questions he could picture. At the conclusion of his remarks there arose a per-fect storm of cheers, mingled with the clapping of hands and the stamping of feet. There could be heard a confused mass of sounds as of an audience rising to their feet and dispersing, amid conversation, laughter and the playing of

The phonograph does not confine itself to utterances made for the benefit of the public. During one of the speeches the chairman of the meeting addressed a remark to a brother politician, over which they both laughed. Both the remark and the laughter were recorded by the transmitter.

An Interesting Decision. PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 2.- Crew, Levick & Co., oil merchants, sued the Bradstreet company to recover damages for alleged untrue information furnished them. The plaintiffs had asked the agacy to give them a report of the Union Refining and Manufacturing company of New Jer sey, and they reported that the company had a paid-up capital of \$600,000, and were in good credit. On the strength of this Crew, Levick & Co. gave them credit for the amount of \$15,000, which they have never been able to collect. It was alleged that the Union Refining company were insolvent at the time the report was furnished. The judge, on a motion for a non-suit, granted it on the ground that the contract was as if between two pri vate people, the defendant corporation being a private and not a public one, and that Crew, Levick & Co., in signing their contract with them, had waived the right to recover on the ground on which they are now striving to get a verdict. He said if they could have proved willful or malicious negligence the circumstances would have been different.


