

# U. S. ORDERS BLAME BE TRACED DOWN FOR TULSA RIOTING

GOVERNMENT DEMANDS INQUIRY TO ASCERTAIN IF FEDERAL LAWS WERE VIOLATED—MARTIAL LAW BAN IS LIFTED.

Washington, June 4.—A general inquiry into the race riots at Tulsa, Okla., has been ordered by Attorney General Daugherty. It was announced at the department of justice. It is intended to determine whether federal laws were violated.

**Martial Law Lifted.**  
Tulsa, Okla., June 4.—Martial law in Tulsa invoked Wednesday morning to quell race rioting was lifted in an order signed soon after a check yesterday afternoon by Adjutant General Barrett.

Previously General Barrett had refused a plea of a Chamber of Commerce that the soldiers be retained for at least a week as a precautionary measure.

A citizens' committee of seven is formulating plans for restoring homes to negroes driven out by arson. A plan to build a model negro district is being considered. The committee expects no difficulty in raising the necessary \$50,000.

Adjutant General Barrett said yesterday that he had the bodies of several negroes in the rioting and proposed to arrest them. The district judge, the county attorney and the citizens' committee went over plans for an investigation. The Bar Association is to appoint a committee to aid the investigation.

The plight of many negroes today was still pitiful. The Red cross is at work relieving the distress of race-hatred victims to have vanished.

Arrested by a few irresponsible negroes was blamed today for the part of the rioting in the race riot here by prominent negroes and Police Commissioner Addison said the police knew negro radicals had been at work for some time. Barney Cleaver, a veteran negro peace officer here, who has the confidence of both white and negroes, cannot afford to neglect the police as one of the principal leaders in the disturbance about the court house Tuesday night.
