

PROTEST AGAINST TEARING UP NORTH SIDE THOROFARES

COMMISSIONER STICKLEN FEARS FIRE RISK WILL BE TOO GREAT IF PAVING FIRM CONTINUES OPERATIONS ON NORRIS STREET.

Objections to the Mid-West Engineering company tearing up Norris street until other thoroughfares leading to the eastern section of North Ottawa had been improved was raised at last night's council meeting by Commissioner Charles Sticklen.

The commissioner opposed any more tearing up on the ground that his department could not keep pace with the paving contractor in moving water boxes and hydrants because of trouble in securing supplies and repairs at the factory.

He considered it dangerous, in view of this condition, to continue ripping up streets because of the risk of fire and recommended that nothing further be done with Norris street until the others leading toward the pumping station be improved.

Mayor Weeks informed his colleague that it was both his and the contractor's intentions of prosecuting the work as rapidly as possible, but he would be guided by the preference of the council in this matter.

Commissioner Sticklen ascribed his troubles in getting repairs and parts for the water system on Norris street to litigation over patents at the factory where they have to be purchased. The curb boxes and hydrants, he said, will all have to be moved out to the curb line as soon as the street is paved.

Want Gas Tanks. Frank Boyle, Marquette and Columbus streets; B. E. Egan, Canal and Madison streets, and W. G. Rossiter, First avenue, petitioned for permission to install gasoline tanks.

Residents of Lafayette street, near Shabbona Park, asked permission to install a new concrete sidewalk near the curb, the petition being referred to Commissioner Dougherty.

The bid of the Joliet Bridge Construction company for the Christie street stairs was thrown out and the clerk was ordered to re-advertise for a letting to be held at a later date. The company bid \$600 over Engineer Farnsworth's estimate, but is reported to have voluntarily offered to cut the offer down \$200.

The payroll, amounting to \$1,966.90, was ordered paid.

FALLING BRICK HITS WORKMAN ON HEAD

David Armstrong, 724 Hudson street in this city, suffered a painful injury to his head while employed at the Chicago Retort & Fire Brick company, early this morning. Armstrong was working around a crusher at the plant when an eight pound brick fell from an overhead conveyor, a distance of eight feet, striking him on the head. His scalp was given a severe gash and he was knocked out by the force of the blow. He was taken to the hospital in the company machine, where his wounds were dressed by Dr. P. J. Clene.

After his wounds were dressed he was able to leave the hospital.

DIAMOND IS CAUSE OF SUIT IN WHICH TWO WOMEN FIGURE

ONE CLAIMS GEM AND OTHER DENIES IT IS HERS—THRESH OUT DISPUTE IN CIRCUIT COURT.

The possession of a diamond set, which one woman claims was in her engagement ring, and another claims has been the cause of a legal battle found in the circuit court before Judge Eldredge and a jury of twelve men, yesterday and today. The plaintiff, Mrs. Gertrude Mulford, is seeking possession of the set, which was replevined from a jeweler shop where Mrs. Christina Englebrecht took it to have it mounted.

Mrs. Mulford claims the diamond was taken from the mounting in her home. Mrs. Englebrecht alleges the jewel had been her property for many years. The case was previously fought out in a Streator justice of the peace court, and gained much attention. Mrs. Englebrecht was the victor in the lower court, and an appeal was taken by Mrs. Mulford to the higher tribunal.

Mrs. Englebrecht was formerly employed in the Mulford home to do laundry work and cleaning. She is represented at the hearing by Attorneys A. E. Butters and George Belford of Streator. Mrs. Mulford is represented by Attorney A. H. Shay. The diamond set is valued at approximately \$150.

The case went on trial yesterday afternoon. The jurors who were accepted to hear the evidence were Noah Patterson, Deer Park; Charles Worrels, Eagle; John Meady, Ottawa; William Temple, Ottawa; George Buffington, La Salle; William Loos, La Salle; Herman Kammerer, Ottawa; Michael Curtain, Ottawa; Edward Luce, Manlius; James Darling, South Ottawa; William Price, Ottawa; Benjamin Fishburn, South Ottawa.

Mrs. Mulford was one of the first witnesses called to the stand. A number of other witnesses were presented by the plaintiff during the afternoon, and it was not until today that the case was turned over to the defense.

Mrs. Englebrecht took the stand just before noon. She claimed that the diamond in question has belonged to her for many years, and never was the property of Mrs. Mulford.

Other Cases. The appeal case brought by John Robes against William Swords was continued today on account of the death of the plaintiff.

The case of F. B. Harden against the Illinois Central railroad was settled and dismissed.

The case of S. J. Marczykowski against Gus Niedrich was dismissed by the plaintiff at the plaintiff's costs.

The case of the George F. Dittman Boot & Shoe Co. against George Moss was dismissed.

The case of R. D. Smith against the C. B. & Q. railroad was dismissed.

Released on Bail. Walter Piser of Fern, who was indicted on a charge of embezzling \$1,200 from his employers, was released when he furnished bonds in the circuit court today, giving Andrew Piser as surety.

Judge H. W. Johnson of this city, has been chosen by Justice Orin N. Carter of the supreme court, as a member of the general committee designated to bring the proposed new constitution of Illinois before the people of the state, with a view to having it ratified at the Dec. 12 election.

Justice Carter himself heads the committee. He is soliciting the ablest and best informed men in the state to aid him in putting across the work he has been designated to carry on. It is not known as yet, just what duties will be assigned to the Ottawa men. The appointment to the committee comes as a decided compliment to the ability of anyone Justice Carter seeks to help with the work.

The will of the late Marjanna Przybylnecki of La Salle, who died September 30th, was filed today. The decedent left real estate and personal property valued at \$3050. A son, Michael will inherit a lot for his life time, after which it will go to his brother Vincent.

A daughter, Amelia will receive \$200, another daughter, Mary, will receive \$200 and a daughter Marie will receive \$50. The son Vincent is residuary heir.
