

PEGGY BEALE, FREED OF MURDER CHARGE, RETURNS TO OTTAWA

SANITARIUM NURSE ACQUITTED FOR KILLING "PERFECT LOVER" MAKES MYSTERIOUS VISITS TO SCENES HERE OF FORMER HAUNTS.

Marie (Peggy) Beale has made two visits to Ottawa since she was acquitted of the slaying of her perfect lover, Frank Anderson, at Kansas City, Mo., on Tuesday, Oct. 24, according to Ottawans who have recognized her. Peggy is said to have walked into the Rock Island station on Wednesday night and checked out three pieces of baggage.

She was recognized by a man on the station platform who was standing just outside the door, and her movements were watched by an interested little group of spectators. Peggy is said to have carried the luggage with her.

Peggy's first visit to Ottawa is said to have been made almost as soon as a train could carry her here after she had been acquitted for killing Anderson. Her acquaintances here declare she left Kansas City about thirty minutes after she walked from the court room a free woman.

She was seen around town for a day or two. Early this week she again entered Ottawa on a night train. It is not known if she boarded a train leaving Ottawa on Wednesday night.

The nature of Miss Beale's visits to Ottawa are veiled in more or less of a mystery. She was seen in the lobby of a downtown hotel on two occasions and recognized by a man who knew her when she was a nurse at the La Sale county sanitarium, south of the city. At the sanitarium today

BONAR LAW HOPES U. S. WILL JOIN LEAGUE

London, Nov. 2.—Prime Minister Bonar Law in an address to a meeting of women in a theater this afternoon reiterated that his policy was one of tranquillity and stability. "As regards foreign policy," he said, "I hope America may gradually take an interest in the league of nations in some form or another and eventually will feel it her duty to help in the chaos in which the war has left the world. Our relations with France must be

the keynote of our foreign policy," the prime minister declared. "We really have common aims."

"As to the home policy the most important thing is to cut down expenditures. We must maintain our naval position. We must retain forces adequate for the security of the empire."
