

MOLENE MEET TO OPEN CAMPAIGN FOR \$1,800,000

Lutherans of Three Cities to Hear Speakers From National Council at Moline Church.

The Lutherans of America are joining in a united effort to relieve the desperate condition of their fellow believers in the war-wrecked countries of Europe. A relief fund of \$1,800,000 is sought to be raised in a campaign embracing all but one of the 18 Lutheran synods in the United States, the work to be done simultaneously throughout the country during the week of May 9-16.

Local Lutheran churches have decided to canvass their members each in its own field, but the campaign will be inaugurated with a mass meeting Sunday evening at 7:45 in the First Lutheran church of Moline. The cause will be presented by two of the 14 speakers sent out by the National Lutheran council to advance the campaign. Rev. C. P. MacLaughlin, D. D., of Pittsburgh, and Dr. George Taylor Kyth of Columbia, S. C., one of the Lutheran commissioners who investigated church and social conditions in the Lutheran lands of Europe last year.
