Rock Island Postmaster's Wife Gets  
Credit for Deceiving Women  
Keeper at Sherman Hotel

Close observation and a real pep-  
chant for detective work on the  
part of Mrs. Ruth Martin, wife of  
the postmaster, Dr. W. E. Martin, 725  
Seventeenth street, has landed Mrs.  
Ruth Borden, staying at the  
Sherman hotel, in the toils of fed-  
eral authorities on a charge of  
forgery and appropriating mail  
matter that did not belong to her.

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DELEGATES TO  
WORK COUNCIL  
ARE VOTED ON

Election at Arsenal Takes Place  
Yesterday but Results Are  
Not Yet Known

Election of representatives to the  
workers' council by the various de-  
partments of the Rock Island arse-  
nal took place yesterday but the  
results have not been compiled in  
time for announcement today. It is  
anticipated that the results will be  
ready for release tomorrow.

Three representatives from 13 de-
