

ROYAL NEIGHBOR WORKERS GIVEN CAMPAIGN TALK

Two Hundred Committee Women Attend Dinner Meeting at Y. W. C. A. Last Evening.

Two hundred committee women in the Royal Neighbors membership drive in Rock Island and Moline received instructions and participated in a pep meeting at the Y. W. C. A. last night. Unusual interest in the campaign was shown by the enthusiasm of those present at the meeting. The drive for 350 new members in the two cities was started Thursday but was officially launched last evening to continue for six weeks.

The chairman in each of the camps in Rock Island and Moline reported progress of the work in their camps. In each instance the chairman either had the applications of the new members or prospective members in view. According to Mrs. Dell Newton, Peoria, state supervising deputy for Illinois, who presided at the meeting last night, the officials anticipated little difficulty in reaching the quota of 350 new members.

Dr. Hada Carlson, supreme physician, Mrs. Lynn Edgett, La Salle, district deputy and Mrs. Dell Newton, gave short talks on the enthusiasm and pep that is needed by every worker in the campaign in order to put the drive over successfully. The committee women received instructions in regard to soliciting new members and were made familiar with all matters pertaining to the society in order that questions which may be asked by the prospective members will be answered intelligently.

Twenty employees from the head office of the society gave a short program and the meeting was closed with the singing of booster songs. The big booster meeting of all the camps in the two cities will be held in the Y. W. C. A. Saturday evening at 8 o'clock. Every member of the society is invited to be present and participate as boosters of the campaign for new members.

Commissioner Rudgren offered a resolution that the C. R. I. & P. Railway company be allowed \$322.88. Carried by unanimous vote.

Commissioner Fitzsimons offered a resolution that during the time of the funerals of Officers Gree and Miner, the city hall and all city offices be kept closed as a token of respect. Carried by unanimous vote.

Commissioner Wich read a report of the board of local improvements recommending the adoption of an ordinance providing for the construction of a 10-inch sewer on the west side of Twelfth street from the sewer at the south end of Maurus addition to a point 30 feet south of Twenty-fifth avenue, and an eight-inch sewer on the south side of Twenty-first avenue from Twelfth street sewer east to a point 800 feet east of Twelfth street; also an estimate of the probable cost of said improvements in amount of \$3,060.00 by the city engineer and engineer of the board of local improvements; and an ordinance providing for the said improvement, which ordinance on his motion was considered by unanimous vote.

Commissioner Wich offered a resolution that the Midway Oil company be granted a permit to erect a filling station at the southeast corner of Sixteenth street and Third avenue, plans for same having been approved by this council. Carried by unanimous vote.

MOLINE ASKS TO HAVE RAILROADS OPEN CROSSINGS

(Special Moline Service.) The city of Moline has petitioned the Illinois commerce commission to issue an order directing the several railroads running through Moline to open Forty-eighth street for general traffic.

Opening of the street will be necessary in order for the city to complete a four-block paving project, which is contemplated for next year. The street is open on both sides of the railroad crossing, but vehicle traffic cannot cross the tracks at the present time.

Contract for the paving of Forty-first street from Fifth avenue to River drive has already been let and the work will be started early in the spring.

A decision on the petition is not expected for a week, it being simply a formality in getting the railroads to act.

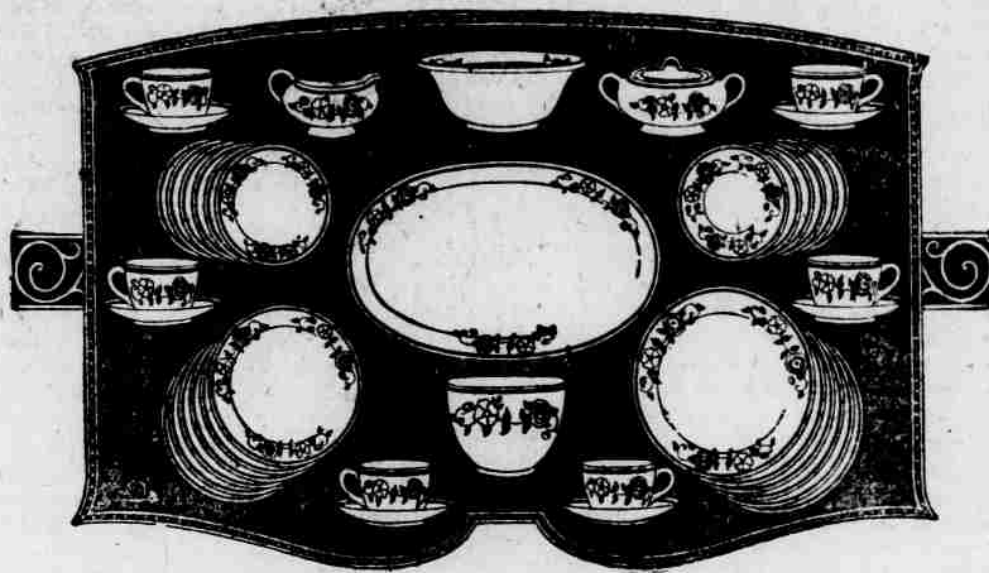
