The two-story brick house at 2327 Fourth avenue, next door to the Bill Gabel resort, owned and until recently operated by Helen Van Dale, under the official protection of Thomas Cox, former chief of police. The resort was one of the most notorious of the Rock Island underworld and was the scene of many frameups and plots instigated by the vice ring.



The Palmer Inn, west of Davenport on the Nabant road, where Helen Van Dale moved after her Fourth avenue resort was closed in the clean-up. Her arrest on a white-slavery charge was based on the removal of the inmates of her Rock Island house to this establishment.

PACKER MERGER HIT BY SENATOR

Senator LaFollette Makes Attack Against Proposed Purchase of Morris Cows by Packers.

Washington, Dec. 6.—The senate today adopted the resolution of Senator LaFollette, Republican, Wisconsin, calling upon the secretary of agriculture for full information regarding the proposed Armour and Morris packer merger.

Washington, Dec. 6.—An attack on the proposed merger of the Armour & Morris meat packing concerns was made in the senate today by Senator LaFollette, Republican, of Wisconsin, who declared that the packers were seeking immunity in advance from President Harding and government officials.

Contrary to Law. Senator LaFollette said he believed the proposed merger to be "contrary to the law and public policy." He added that the past history of the large packers was one of "shameful defiance" of the law.
