Fred Buck, formerly of Rock Island, and recently clerk in the office of the division superintendent of the C. & N. W. road at Clinton, Iowa, has been appointed to the position of chief clerk to the claim agent of the entire Northwestern system. Mr. Buck is climbing right ahead in the railroad service.

Thomas Thorp, of Drury, was in the city today. Making annual Appropriations for the Fiscal Year 1894.

Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Rock Island:

Sec. 1. That there be and hereby is appropriated to be provided for by the general tax levy for the current fiscal year, the aggregate sum of fifty-six thousand seven hundred and seventy-four and 80-100 dollars (\$56,774 80-100) for the following purposes:

Official Report of the City Council.

CITY COUNCIL ROOM, ROCK ISLAND, May 31.—The council met in adjourned session at 8 p. m. Mayor Medill presiding and all the aldermen present.

Ald. Foss presented a petition from the residents of the vicinity of Thirty-eighth street asking that that street be graded, improved and macadamized, either out of the general fund or by special assessment. Referred to street and alley committee.

The clerk read a request from the Davis company to open a paved street to make a water connection. Granted, on motion of Ald. Corken.

The council went into committee of the whole on the annual appropriation bill, on motion of Ald. Bladel, and Ald. Schneider took the chair.

On the rising of the committee, Ald. Schneider reported the annual appropriation ordinance, in amount \$56,774.80, and moved its adoption. Passed by unanimous vote.

Ald. Schneider also reported a resolution distributing revenues in various funds, the aggregate amount being \$103,130.32, and moved its adoption. Adopted by unanimous vote.

Ald. Nelson offered a resolution to notify owners of Columbia park to remove certain fences. Adopted.

Ald. Bladel moved that the city clerk notify George Wagner to pay his water rent within 10 days or the water will be shut off. Carried.

Ald. Corken moved that the fire and light committee be authorized to sell or trade a certain horse to the best advantage. Carried.

Ald. Dauber moved that another horse be purchased for the police, the cost not to exceed \$125. Carried—13 yeas; Ald. Kennedy excused.

Adjourned on motion of Ald. Bladel. A. D. HUESING, City Clerk.
