Flag Day.

It was June 14, 1777, that congress adopted the national ensign. It was enacted that "the flag of the 13 United States be 13 stripes, alternate red and white; that the union be 13 stars, white in a blue field, representing a new constellation." April 4, 1818, it was enacted that from and after the 4th day of July next the flag of the United States be 13 horizontal stripes, alternate red and white; that the union be twenty stars, white in a blue field, and that on the admission of a new state into the union one star be added to the union of the flag; and that each addition take effect, on the 4th day of July next succeeding such admission." Since that date 25 stars, representing 25 sovereign states have been added to the field of blue on the flag.

For the reason that June 14 is the date of the first official adoption of the "Stars and Stripes" as the flag of the republic of the United States, by general consent this anniversary has

In these latter days come to be considered as "Flag Day," and is coming to be more and more observed by the people of all parts of the country.

In pursuance of this custom this is "Flag Day," and is so observed by millions of American citizens all over the land. More American flags are floating throughout the world today than at any time in history, as a sign of the overmastering power of this republic, as well as of the patriotic endorsement of the efforts of the United States government to suppress cruelty on the island of Cuba and extend liberty to its oppressed inhabitants; but the number ought to be largely added to in celebration of the anniversary of the birth of the flag, which occurs in the midst of the most expensive and most unselfish struggle in the history of nations.

The greatest lesson to be gained from the calamitous ending of the Letter wheat deal is the establishment anew of the fact that the time has not arrived in the history of this country when unrestrained ambition may control that which in any part goes into its national, commercial or agricultural greatness. The young Chicago speculator has wasted a year of labor and anxiety in trying to corner the fruits of toil and control the staff of life. He has barely tasted the sweets of gratification, to have it snatched from him because he held the tempting cup to his lips too long. The story of the Letter wheat deal is briefly told as follows:

WHITE MAN, THIS TIME.

Judge Lynch Takes Charge of a Kansas Town and Outrages Law.

Great Bend, Kan., June 12.—In the public square fronting on the principal business street of this city a murderer was lynched last evening by a mob of probably 500 persons. It is estimated that at least 1,000 men of Great Bend's population of 2,500 persons witnessed the tragedy. The victim was John Becker, a white man aged 30, who on April 8 killed Myrtle Huffmeier, the 16-year-old daughter of William Huffmeier, Becker was employed by Farmer Huffmeier, and professed possession, at least for the daughter, and the tragedy followed the girl's refusal to accept his advances.

When the girl went to the stable in the evening Becker shot her to death, sending eight bullets into her body, after which he set fire to the farmer's stable. At first it was reported that the murderer had shot himself, but later it became known that he had fled and search was instituted. On April 13 a posse of farmers captured the murderer near St. John, Stafford county, and for safe keeping he was taken by the sheriff to Hutchinson, there having been many threats that he would be lynched if brought here.

Becker had been brought here for trial, and the lynchers embraced the opportunity. Many of the mob are known, but no prosecution is likely. Becker is from Marion, Ill., and of a good family.

PRAIRIE STATE REPUBLICANS.

Anti-Allen Law Men Appear Beaten by the Country Delegates.

Springfield, Ill., June 14.—The hotels are crowded with delegates to the Republican state convention, which convenes at noon today. The convention will be the largest ever held in the state, consisting of 1,500 delegates. It was decided by the state central committee to make Charles A. Works, of Rockford, temporary chairman, and Judge H. J. Hamlin, of Shelbyville, permanent chairman. The topic most discussed is the proposal of a fight over a resolution condemning the Allen bill and demanding its repeal. It looks as if the anti-Allen people are beaten. They seem to be largely out-numbered by the delegates from the country, who declare that such a resolution will mean the defeat of several Republican candidates for the legislature.

E. K. Whittemore seems certain of the nomination for state treasurer. The nomination for state superintendent of public instruction is being contested for by Alfred Bayless, of Swanton, Marvin Quackenbush, of Dundee; J. E. Bangs, of Pontiac; Walter R. Kimsey, of Tamaroa, and J. H. Brownlee, of Carbondale. Senator Masen has arrived. Senator Cullom will not be here.
