POLITICS IN IOWA STATE.

Democratic Conference Decides on the Principles of the Party.

Des Moines, Ia., Dec. 22,-About fifty of the leading members of the Silver Democratic party of Iowa held a conference in this city. While no definite resolutions were passed declaring the principles of the party as they have been changed to meet new conditions an understanding was reached as to the ssues upon which the party will unite and which will doubtless be incorporated in the next state platform. Briefly summed up the declarations acceptable to a majority of these in the conference, were as follows:

The party is opposed to fusion with any other party. The party is unani-mously in favor of bimetallism, but the question of ratio will not be given prominence. The Chicago platform may be indorsed but there should be no repetition of the words '16 to 1." The greenbacks should not be retired. The placing of the national currency in the hands of private corporations or na-tional banks is bitterly opposed. The formation of trusts is condemned. Tae policy of imperialism, or of expansion, and the annexation of Cuba and Porto Rico is unadvisable.

The standing army must not be inreased as is contemplated in the Hull illi. The present army is sufficient for all the needs of the government. The liquor traffic in lowa can best be controlled by the enactment of a local option law, the question of a license or complete prohibition being determined by each county.
