

The shot was fired from Sheriff White's home across the street. Baker died instantly. For days the court has been hearing arguments on the motion for change of venue and the motion was granted Saturday, whereupon court adfourned.

Fired from the Sheriff's Porch. Tom Baker, the defendant, was still out on bail, and as he was leaving the court house with the crowd he was shot dead. Baker was charged with the

murder of Will White, a brother of Sheriff White.
