FOR RAILROAD MEN.

Successful Work Under the Auspices of the Young Men's Christian Association.

VIEWS OF SECRETARY A. M. BRUNER.

Tells of Necessity for Accommodations for Employees of the Roads Who Are Obligated to Spend a Portion of Their Time Away From Home—Remarkable Growth of the Movement.

A. M. Bruner, the genial secretary of the railroad branch of the Y. M. C. A. for Illinois, the other day talked to an Argus reporter about the development and prospects of his branch of the work in this and in other states. "Every railroad man, and every one else who has given matters pertaining to railroads and their management any thought," said Mr. Bruner, "recognizes the necessity for accommodations for railroad employees who are compelled to spend a portion of their time off the road away from home. The Peoria road here in Rock Island has, within the past few weeks, provided such accommodations for the men who reside in Peoria, but stop here for a period during their runs. These men had formerly slept in cabooses in corners of the round house, or wherever else they could find a place. The company has fitted up a comfortable cottage with beds and a reading room, and the men repay the outlay with better service."

"There is a rule on most roads forbidding employees entering saloons on pain of dismissal, thus often barring them out of the only place where they can find any real comfort. The plan adopted by the Peoria road here has been tried by many large roads on an extensive scale, but all such attempts have ultimately failed either through lack of foresight on the part of the officials, or want of cooperation on the part of the men. It was only when the work was taken up by the Y. M. C. A., in whose hands it properly belongs, that a way out of the difficulty was found. The reasons for the success of the latter are two: The association has had more experience along the necessary lines, and can devote more time to the development of plans than would be possible for any set of railroad officials. Then, the religious element, while seemingly so foreign to the makeup of the average railroad man, is in reality a sustaining force."

Not a New Work.
"The railroad department is not a new one. It has been in existence over twenty years, but it is only recently that its real importance has been felt, particularly in the western and southern states. Such roads as the New York Central, Grand Trunk, Wabash, Big Four, and many others, endorse the system and encourage the efforts of the association in this direction. The sum of \$160,000 was appropriated last year out of corporation funds for this purpose, and \$60,000 of it was put into new buildings. There are nine railroad associations in this state, and last year witnessed the erection of a large building at Decatur and the organization of a membership there of 350 men."

There is an international secretary

in Chicago who works with State Secretary Bruner in the establishment of new associations. These gentlemen are kept busy investigating conditions and preparing plans for different points as requested by the officials of the roads interested. Last year, in addition to the work done at Decatur, investigations were conducted at Peoria, Roodhouse and Danville.

At Peoria the work was taken up at the instance of the Peoria & Pekin Union company, and plans were submitted for the erection of a building at Bridge Junction to cost, with equipment, \$13,000. At this point 600 men would be benefited, and the association proposed to raise \$3,000, asking \$10,000 from the company for the erection of the building and \$1,800 yearly for its maintenance. At a recent meeting, the stockholders granted all that was asked of them, and work will commence as soon as possible.

At Roodhouse, after looking into the conditions, at the request of the Chicago & Alton road, a building costing \$8,000 was recommended, and is regarded with great favor by the officials.

At Danville, where there are 1,200 railroad men, the C. & E. I. road has taken up the matter and a \$10,000 building will be recommended.

Raising the Funds.
In cases similar to the above, the association usually asks the corporation to furnish three-fourths of the cost of construction, the remainder to be contributed by the men or raised by subscription. The cost of maintenance is largely defrayed by membership fees and a moderate room rent, the balance to be paid from the railroad funds. Such institutions are not self-sustaining, as has been shown by experience, but it has also been proved that a contribution to their support is a profitable investment on the part of the roads, and in no case has such contribution been discontinued after having been once begun.

The Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific road has on its pay rolls in this city 1,200 men, all centrally located with reference to the yard and Mr. Bruner believes there is probably no place in the state where a branch railroad department of the Y. M. C. A. is more needed or would be more successful than here in our own Rock Island.

A GAME WITH REDSKINS.
Rock Island Ball Team Will Probably Open With Nebraska Indians.

The Rock Island baseball team will probably open the season at the Twelfth street park with the Nebraska Indian team. The date has not been settled yet, but it will either be the latter part of April or along about the 6th of May. The managers are dickering now. The Nebraska aggregation is said to be composed entirely of genuine redmen from the western plains and reservations. In 1899 their record was 108 games won and 35 lost.

Amusements.
The Chase-Lister company is to hold the boards at Harper's theatre all next week, opening Sunday night, to popular prices.

The indications are that the Lake Forest University Glee, Banjo and Mandolin clubs will be heartily welcomed here March 30. The club has achieved a high reputation as entertainers and well deserves a cordial reception.

The picture reproduction of the Jeffries-Sharkey fight at Harper's theatre last night was a popular entertainment, attracting a good sized audience and apparently sending everyone home satisfied. So vividly were the details as they transpired at the ringside at Coney Island presented that many, forgetting that the battle was really fought months ago, imagined themselves spectators of the real thing. The pictures are an improvement over others that were here in former years.

ON PERJURY CHARGE.

W. H. Eastman is Held to the Grand Jury in Bonds of \$700.

ALLEGED HE TOOK FALSE OATH.

His Arrest Caused by George Seidel, a Workman, on Whom the Defendant Had Secured a Garnishee Writ, Having Sworn. It is Charged, to Untruths—Preliminary Hearing in Justice Hawes' Court.

William H. Eastman, a collector and insurance agent, whose home is at 2902 Eleventh-and-a-half avenue, was late yesterday afternoon held by Justice David Hawes to the grand jury on a charge of perjury, his bond being fixed at \$700.

The warrant for Eastman's arrest was sworn out by Joseph Seidel in Magistrate Stafford's court, from which a change of venue was taken. Seidel is employed by the Rock Island Lumber company. He alleged that Eastman, in order to obtain a garnishee summons against him, made affidavit that Justice W. F. Schroeder had issued an execution on a judgment in his court; that the execution had been returned by Constable G. W. Sample "no property found." Seidel charged that Eastman made these representations before Justice O. E. Cramer, by whom the garnishee summons was issued.

Evidence Offered.
Justice Schroeder and Constable Sample were called as witnesses to corroborate Seidel's statement. Justice Schroeder swore he never had issued an execution in the suit in his court in which Seidel is defendant, submitting his docket in substantiation of the statement. Constable Sample declared he had never seen the execution that Eastman represented had been served by him.

Eastman is a member of the firm of Eastman & Co., having offices adjoining Justice Schroeder's court on Second avenue.

Ludolph & Reynolds prosecuted for the state, and M. E. Sweeney was counsel for Eastman.
