Rock Island Retailers Preparing for Their Trip to Joliet.

The Rock Island Retail Merchants' association meeting last night was poorly attended, other attractions being numerous, and little of importance was done.

A communication was read from the retail merchants of Freeport, stating that they would bring an excursion of between 1,500 and 2,000 persons here on July 18. Another from the retail grocers of Quincy stated that they will take the town by storm Sunday, July 15. Regret among the merchants here was expressed that the latter would arrive Sunday, as many of our business men will not feel like playing the part of hosts on that day.

The matter of advertising the excursion to Joliet, to be given July 31, was placed in the hands of the excursion committee.

At the close of the meeting the secretary stated that a good attendance at the next meeting, two weeks hence, is much desired, as it will be the last one before the excursion and a new constitution will be ready for adoption.

NOT MENTIONED IN PLANS.

New Kansas City & Southern Scheme Has No Local Interest.

If current rumor is to be believed there is an end of all hope of this city that the Davenport, Rock Island & Northwestern is to become but a link in a great chain of railway line leading from the lakes at Chicago to the gulf of Port Arthur. This was the glittering prospect held out to us by Mr. Gates when he was the controlling factor in the Pittsburg, Kansas City & Gulf. But since that road has been worked over into the Kansas City & Southern the situation has changed. It is now reported that the Chicago & Alton, the Kansas City Southern and the Union Pacific systems are to be amalgamated and placed under one management. Stuart Knott, who recently resigned the vice presidency of the Plant system, it is said, has been elected a vice president of the Alton consolidated systems instead of the Alton alone. This position, it is further rumored, will be only a temporary one, and before New Year's he will be elevated to the office of president of the three Harriman roads, President Felton, of the Alton, going to New York to assume the office of chairman of the boards of directors of the three companies. Mr. Felton has been in New York for some time, conferring with Mr. Harriman. The meeting, it is said, is for the purpose of arranging details for carrying out the above plans.

Since the three roads named, under the Oregon Short Line, came under the control of the Harriman syndicate, there has been every indication that Mr. Harriman and those associated with him have been anxious to consolidate the great properties so that there would be a minimum expense in their operation. The coming together will also enable the establishment of a more complete traffic service, giving the syndicate through lines from Chicago to Portland, Ore., and to Port Arthur on the Gulf of Mexico. In none of these, however, is there any hint of anything of interest to us. There is no possibility that the Kansas City & Southern or the Alton will reach our way, and there appears to be no indication that anybody else is going to push the line down in that direction.

SWENSSON DECLINES.

Kansas Educator Says He Will Not Accept Call to Augustana.

WILL REMAIN WITH BETHANY.

States His Reasons--Meeting of Directors of Local College.

Dr. Carl Swensson, the founder and president of Bethany college at Lindborg, Kas., has given a negative answer to the call by the Augustana synod, lately assembled at Burling-

ton, Iowa, to the presidency of Augustana College and Theological seminary at Rock Island. Dr. Swensson said last night:

"Bethany college is only 19 years old, has forged to the front most wonderfully, had 650 students last year and has improved financially most satisfactorily during the past four years, but it is as yet practically unendowed. I feel that it would be an injustice to Bethany to leave her, my child, now and go into the service of a rival institution.

"The citizens, the college board, the faculty the students, the congregation all have implored me to remain, extending to me the most eloquent tributes of respect, love and confidence. The way for me to show my appreciation is to stay where I know I am wanted."

Foss Re-elected.
The board of directors of Augustana college is in session here today.

The board organized by electing Rev. Dr. L. Holmes, of Burlington, Iowa, president, and Rev. J. G. Dahlberg, of Rock Island, secretary.

C. W. Foss was re-elected vice president of the college for the ensuing year.

One of the college directors said today he was yet hopeful of Dr. Swensson accepting the presidency of Augustana. He was of the opinion his announced declination was due to the fact that the official board of the college had failed to extend him a formal written call. Dr. Swensson is expected to be in Rock Island tomorrow.

CITY REFUSES PRISONERS.

Those Sentenced to Work on Streets Not Accepted.

The city authorities have failed to receive prisoners recently sentenced by Judge Gest to labor on the streets, and complications between the city and county authorities may arise. In imposing the sentence the judge exercises the power vested in him by state law, but it is claimed that the cost of guarding prisoners while at work, together with their board, is greater than the value of the labor performed and the city is not disposed to assume the expense. While it is not known what steps Judge Gest will take in the matter, the fact that he has sentenced a prisoner to labor on the streets after being informed of the city's attitude, leads to the conclusion that he intends taking some action.
