The company is made up of a lot of clever performers and specialty artists, including among the number Lou Knicker, one of the best club swingers ever seen in Butte; Don Gordon, a remarkable trick bicycle rider and on the unicycle; Harry Freeman and the Smith brothers, a team of acrobatic wonders; the Van brothers in a musical act, and the La Barre trio, another team of very clever acrobats. The performance concludes with Bobbie Beach's troupe of wonderful trained dogs."

Next Saturday, matinee and night, at the Butte, Idaho, port, F. C. Whitney and Edwin Knowles will present for the first time here their stupendous production of "Quo Vadis" as dramatized by Stanislaus Stange. Those who have read the book will not find the lines of the play to be the same, for Stange has taken the original from which to make out many of the finer points not to be found in the English version. Of course the story is the same, and many thrilling incidents portrayed are faithfully painted in life in such a realistic manner that it does not need very much of a stretch of the imagination to believe that one is actually participating in the events that occurred in such rapid

succession during those days when the Christians were so generously persecuted in Rome.

A comedy constructed on modern lines, introducing characters living as the end of the nineteenth century, and scenes familiar to habits of busy, financial centres, also an excellent company headed by Hennessy Leroy, and you have as a result a success of the season, "Other People's Money," which will be presented at Harper's theatre next Sunday. In this production is united all the elements which constitute a success. Mr. Leroy would undoubtedly produce a favorable impression in any of the comedies requiring a finished artist, but his delineation of the character of the Chicago stock-broker is a creation worthy of rank as one of the few rare instances of special adaptation of the person to the situation. In an uninterrupted tour of the country, extending entirely through the theatrical season, there has not been a case of adverse criticism of the production.
