

ALL BUT ASSURED

Theatre Canvass Expected to Be Wound Up the Present Week.

GOOD LIFT AT CLUB MEETING

Amount Yet Needed Should Be Immediately Forthcoming.

Subscriptions were secured in an amount that practically insures the new theatre at the meeting last night at the Rock Island Club, public-spirited citizens, who had already taken tickets, coming forward at a critical moment in the canvass and pledging additional financial assistance that means a modern theatre for the city next season. The meeting was the most enthusiastic that has yet been held in the interest of the project. J. B. Arthurs, who has been here several weeks, while receiving encouragement at the outset, found it uphill work when he was without committeemen, and gave it out finally that he would be compelled to abandon the field in order to give his attention to pressing business matters elsewhere, unless some definite action were taken. Thereupon the subscribers were called together to give their answer. They proved by their increased subscriptions that they did not want to see the enterprise fail, and it is believed will have their efforts seconded by others who will be visited in the next two days by the canvasser, who announces he will remain in the city until Friday to close up the subscription list. Only a few hundred dollars more are needed and it should be readily forthcoming. The Argus has contended from the first that the project could be made to win, and fulfillment of this prediction is expected within a short time.

Tickets Yet to Be Sold.

It should be understood that there are yet several tickets to be taken before all doubt is removed as to the success of the theatre project. The canvasser and a committee are out today and are accomplishing good work, which, if continued, will insure early closing up of the canvass.

George H. Johnson, Mr. McArthur's business associate, is expected in Rock Island tomorrow, to be prepared for the selection of a building site in the event of the closing up of the ticket sale.

DINOSAURS' BONES

Parts of Monsters Eighty and Sixty Feet Long Found in South Dakota.

Scientists have discovered the remains of two monster dinosaurs or lizards at Seven Pines bluff, near Sturgis, on the Fort Meade reservation, S. D. The discovery was made last fall by a member of the United States geological survey, who called the attention of the American Museum of Natural History of New York to the big bones that protruded from the jurassic clay. An expedition was organized by that association, and Professor G. R. Wieland, an authority on such fossils, was put in charge.

The first discovery was a vertebra of very large size, coated all over with iron and silica, which made it look like a boulder. It was close to a trail and had not been recognized as being anything but a boulder. A few feet from this a femur was discovered which is fully 6 feet long and at the smallest place is 12 inches in diameter.

Near the place where the first large bones were discovered were found bones which are supposed to have been those of another lizard, smaller in size than the first one. From careful estimates made by Professor Wieland it is thought the larger animal was fully 90 feet long and the smaller one 60 feet.
