DINOSAURS' BONES

Parts of Monsters Eighty and Sixty Feet Long Found in South Dakota. Scientists have discovered the remains of two monster dinosaurs or lizards at Seven Pines bluff, near Sturis, on the Fort Meade reservation, S. D. The discovery was made last fall by a member of the United States geolegical survey, who called the attention of the American Museum of Natural History of New York to the big bones that pretruded from the jura triassic clay. An expedition was organized by that association, and Professor G. R. Wieland, an authority on such fossils,

was put in charge. The first discovery was a vertebra of very large size, coated all over with iron and silien, which made it look like a bowlder. It was close to a trail and had not been recognized as being anything but a bowlder. A few feet from this a femur was discovered which is fully 6 feet long and at the smallest

place is 12 inches in diameter. Near the place where the first large ones were discovered were found ones which are supposed to have been those of another lizard, smaller in size than the first one. From careful estimates made by Professor Wieland it is thought the larger animal was fully of feet long and the smaller one 60 fe t.
