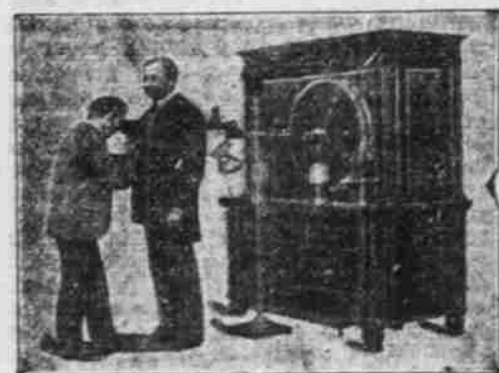

## DAVENPORT DOINGS

I. J. McFee, one of the alleged fakirs arrested during the week, has brought suit against Chief Martens for \$5,000 for false imprisonment.

Mr. and Mrs. Herman Offermann, of 1622 West Seventh street, met with a double affliction Friday. At noon occurred the death of their 24-year-old son, Frank, from pneumonia, and at 8 o'clock Friday evening, the 5-year-old daughter, Lillie May, succumbed to the same dread disorder. A third child is also ill with the disease.

Jacob M. Nabstedt received a cablegram Friday announcing to him the sad fact of the death of his father, Jacob Frederick Nabstedt, which occurred in Dirmarschen, Germany, at 11 o'clock Friday forenoon, at the age of 86 years.

At a meeting held by the six directors of the Tri-City Racing association, which was held at the office of A. W. Vander Veer in the Masonic temple, Saturday, the July meeting at the Mile Track was declared off. A week from yesterday the national business meeting of the North American Turnerbund will be under way in this city. The meeting will bring delegates to Davenport from nearly every state in the union, the societies of the country being entitled to 100 delegates, nearly all of whom will come.

While unloading a car load of bananas at the Martin-Woods company's warehouse, Harry Wilkens, one of the employees, discovered a tarantula about the size of a silver dollar in body and with legs two inches long. The insect was inveigled into a paper bag and will figure hereafter in some collection in the tri-cities. The other day Gus Tetzner, another employee, found one of the virulent insects whose body was about the size of a dime.

all day, as everybody knows. As a consequence there was nothing doing until evening. In the evening there was a period of a couple of hours in which the fair was going again, to the usual Saturday evening crowd. Friday and Saturday the fair was kept going at a loss, and the rain cost thousands of dollars. If the fair paid out, its ability to make money under favorable weather conditions was satisfactorily demonstrated.

Maggie Hines was subjected to another remarkable operation last week. Father Niemann saw that the sister, of which there were several, were given good homes. The Schebler and Werthmann families looked after them. Some three or four years ago Maggie was operated upon by Dr. W. S. Allen, and a matted ball of hair, that completely filled her stomach, was extracted at St. Luke's hospital. She recovered from the operation nicely and was thought to be cured. But the habit with her was second nature. Like those who gnaw their finger nails, Maggie would pluck a hair from her head and nibble at it as though it were a tidbit. The result was that she grew ill some time ago and was sent to Morbionia hospital for treatment. There it was discovered that she was back at her old habit again. Dr. E. S. Bowman diagnosed the case and performed the operation last Thursday, taking from her stomach a ball of snarled and tangled hair of an astonishing size. Still another mass remains in the bowels which will necessitate a second operation in about ten days. According to scientific authority only eight cases of the kind have been known. In only three of which the operation has been a success. The operation performed upon Miss Hines several years ago by Dr. Allen was exploited far and wide at the time as being unique in surgical practice. Maggie is said to be recovering nicely from the operation. It being the second one, she evidently is becoming used to it.

The police on the Rock Island side of the river had an interesting chase early yesterday morning after a colored man wanted for doing up a Davenport policeman and getting away with his gun. The fugitive crossed to Rock Island on the Crescent bridge, and although trace of him was secured and followed through the city, he escaped. The officer who allowed the colored man to get the best of him was Ed. Brehmer. About 4 o'clock yesterday morning the officer met the colored man, who was a powerful fellow and of decidedly suspicious appearance. The latter did not give a very coherent account of himself and Brehmer decided to take him to the station. While passing an alley the prisoner requested that his captor take him through it, but the latter refused. The colored man started to turn and the officer shoved him back. Then the prisoner clinched. The officer saw the flash of a razor and broke away just in time, receiving a slight cut on the face. Before the darkey could recover Brehmer swung his club and knocked him down. Then, instead of following up his advantage, the officer closed in and the prisoner again grappled him around the hips. While the officer was trying to get a chance to use his club the negro got hold of his gun and pulling it out reversed the situation by shoving it up under Brehmer's chin. The colored man, of course, got away, covering the officer with his own gun till out of reach. He then came on across the bridge, meeting en route a couple of men. The latter say he had a gun in each hand, showing that he had one of his own, and he told the others to get out of the way, which they did.

Jocho Mauwaring, the king of Bucktown, is under bonds of \$500 on a charge of attempting to kill John Stapleton, aged 20, and his saloon license has been revoked by the mayor. Mauwaring took a shot at Stapleton yesterday. His injury is not serious, however.

M. T. McDaniel was held to the grand jury in \$500 bonds for forgery by Justice Finger this morning. G. W. McCaskrin, of Rock Island, appeared as attorney for the defendant.

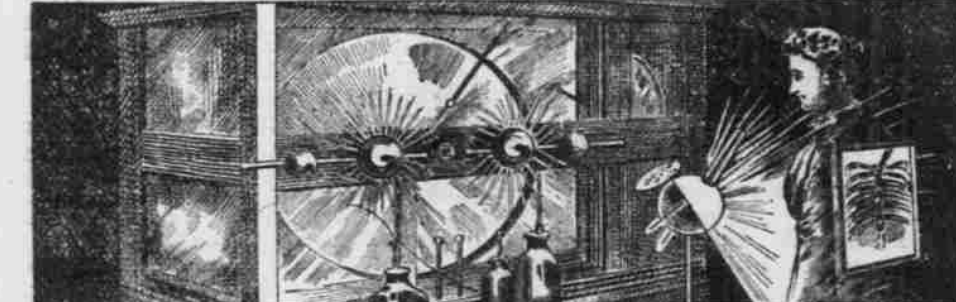
