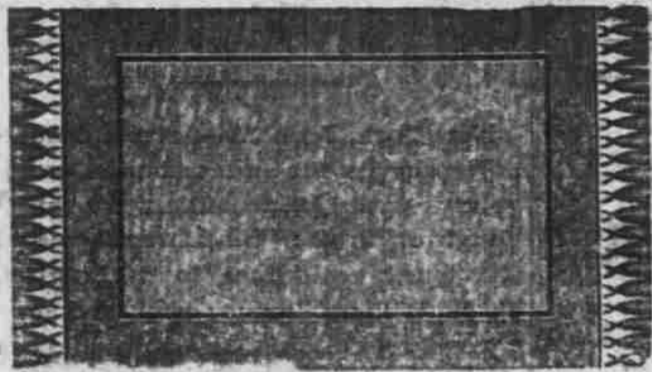

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DAVENPORT DOTS

Frank Janss, an employe on the construction work of the Tri-City Railway company's extension on the Buckingham road, was assaulted by a villainous workman on the same job yesterday. Janss and the man got into a dispute over the nature of the work, whereupon the other fellow fetched Janss a blow with an iron bar which laid open his scalp. The coward then ran, and Janss had to be laid off for the day for repairs. No arrests have yet been made. Janss boards at the Farmer's hotel on Scott street.

After a hiatus of several weeks smallpox has again broken out in the city. Dr. George W. Middleton was called Thursday and visited the home of the McGuire family at 924 Harrison street, where he found the 17-year-old daughter suffering from a well developed case. The house has been placed under quarantine and every effort will be made to prevent any further spread of the disease.

Mayor Becker upon his return from the democratic convention at Des Moines, issued an order and had notice of the same served upon the members of the police department, prohibiting the discharge of fireworks of any kind within the city limits previous to the Fourth of July. Already there has been some complaint in this respect and although the mayor is an ardent supporter of the Declaration of Independence and the proper celebration of the Fourth as may be found anywhere, he feels that in order to safely guard the interests of the public, that such a prohibitive measure is necessary.

The representatives of the International Construction company of Detroit, Mich., to whom was awarded the contract for the construction of the Davenport and Suburban road, are still in the city and getting ready for active work. These representatives include Theodore A. Schulte, president of the company; C. H. Lawrence, G. W. Morgan and F. H. Laneshire. When interviewed President Schulte gave out the following statement: "Messrs. Morgan, Laneshire and myself will from now on be permanently located in Davenport until the completion of the road. We are now engaged in completing the surveys and taking measurements for our city lines. Our rails and ties will begin to arrive in the city within a week, when we will start work. Just where we will start will be determined at a meeting to be held at 4 o'clock today. We will spend the entire day tomorrow in looking over our proposed line to Muscatine."

At Morbionia hospital yesterday occurred the death of William Hollingsworth at the age of 65 years, the fatal ailment being a complication of the heart and kidney trouble. Deceased was for some time an employe of the street car company and has resided on West Second street, and more recently boarded at 520 Main street.

The latest interurban proposition that has reached Davenport, is to the effect that a line is now proposed and bids fair to be built, which will connect Davenport and Iowa City. The company, which will know as the Davenport and Iowa City Railway company, will shortly be incorporated and it is understood that a number of well known Davenport business men will be interested in the new company.

A warrant was issued yesterday from Justice Roddevelt's court, against Julius Fleishman, the Second street clothing man, charging him with selling goods Sunday, June 21, in violation of the state Sunday closing law. The warrant was signed by Albert Petersen, who is acting for the union which is back of the movement to close all of the stores on Sunday. The warrant was to be served in the afternoon. Mr. Fleishman when seen stated that he would probably fight the case. He stated that he thought that it was his right to sell goods on Sunday if he desired, and he would like to see the case tested.

Sheriff Morgan of Clinton county, arrived in Davenport yesterday afternoon after D. H. Andrews, the man who was found in a demented condition by the police, and who claimed he was a newspaper man and worth a million. Mr. Morgan states that Andrews is a painter by trade, and that he has a wife and family living in Clinton. He stated that the man had been in the sanitarium at Moline.

The Carpenters' and Joiners union No. 1273, in its regular meeting, elected officers for the next six months. Many of the old officers were re-elected and there was little opposition. The officers elected were as follows: President, John Fisher; vice president, A. S. Benson; recording secretary, W. T. Gallagher; financial secretary, W. H. Hitchcock; treasurer, O. M. Stoughton; conductor, H. G. Dutton; warden, John Soller, Jr.; delegate to Tri-City District Council, W. H. Hitchcock.

Matthew Zang, a barber from Kewanee, Ill., was found floating in an upright position about 200 feet from the dock. As soon as the floater had been brought in Coroner Langbech was notified and the body taken to Boies' undertaking rooms, where it was announced that the inquest would take place this morning at 9 o'clock. The body had the appearance of being in the water about forty-eight hours, being badly swollen and discolored. A pawn ticket calling for a gold watch and signed by Matthew Zang gave the authorities the first clue to the man's address. Zang left Kewanee last Monday, pawning his watch at Cornus' pawn shop in that city. He stated at the time that he was going to St. Joe on an excursion and needed some money. He left that day on a forenoon train and had not been heard of since. The dead man comes of a very good family in Kewanee, although he had always been known as a drinking man. Late in life he had been employed in a barber shop. He is married and has several children. The inquest today resulted in a verdict in accordance with the above facts.
