

## THE WEATHER

Showers and thunderstorms tonight and Sunday; not much change in temperature.

An extensive area of low pressure covers the country from the Pacific coast to the Mississippi valley, with the lowest barometer readings in British Columbia and southwestern Kansas.

Light rains have fallen from Roseburg northward to Victoria, and showers and thunderstorms have also occurred in the Missouri and upper Mississippi and Ohio valleys, in the southern portion of the lake region, and at numerous stations along the Atlantic coast. A rain of 2.84 inches is reported from Kansas City and one of 1.80 inches from Jacksonville, Fla.

Light rains are again noted in Wyoming and Yellowstone park, and freezing weather is observed in Alberta. The temperatures are generally higher throughout the northern.
