SOUTH POLE TRIP

Dr. Otto Nordenskjold Tells of His Antarctic Explorations.

TWO YEARS IN ICY REGION

Expedition from Sweden on Board Ship "Antarctic"—Lecture Illustrated by Views.

Dr. Otto Nordenskjold, the celebrated explorer of the south polar regions, delivered his illustrated lecture, "Two Years Among the Ice of the South Pole," in the auditorium of Augustana college last evening, to a large and thoroughly attentive audience.

Many attempts by famous explorers have been made to reach the north pole, but because of its almost inaccessible situation, as it is, by great quantities of ice, comparatively few attempts have been made to reach the south pole. Dr. Nordenskjold in 1901 and 1902 made the most successful attempt on record and it was of this remarkable voyage fraught with thrilling and interesting experiences, that he spoke last evening. After overcoming almost insuperable difficulties and relying upon his own efforts, Dr. Nordenskjold and his companions aboard the ill-fated ship "Antarctic" set sail for this land of perpetual snow and ice.

Remarkable Discoveries.
For two years he labored in the interest of science on this land where no human foot had ever before trod. He told of terrible suffering and privations which they were compelled to endure, of the pleasures and disappointments that came and went, and of the important and remarkable discoveries in geography and geology which he has added to science. Fossils of animals and well preserved leaf prints were found which strengthened Dr. Nordenskjold's theory that geologically, the land surrounding the south pole is a continuation of South America and that it at one time had a luxuriant floral growth and was inhabited by animals of no small size. The lecture was illustrated with views taken by Dr. Nordenskjold on this trip and from paintings by one of the party, which were particularly interesting and beautiful.

Personality of Explorer.
Dr. Nordenskjold's history is full of interesting events. He is a nephew of that famous Arctic explorer, Baron Nordenskjold, a graduate from the University of Upsala with the degree of doctor of philosophy, an honorary member of the geological societies in London, Amsterdam and other such

societies in the large cities of Europe and South America. He wears decorations from the kings of Sweden and Spain, and has received gold medals from many famous societies and cities. He has written extensively the results of his explorations in East Greenland, and in the extreme end of South America, Terra del Fuego, and Patagonia. He speaks English, Spanish, French and German, besides Swedish.

Time Is Limited.
Augustana was particularly fortunate in procuring Dr. Nordenskjold for his time is limited to one month in this country, and he delivers in this time 25 lectures in the more important universities and colleges.

After the lecture an opportunity was given those interested to meet Dr. Nordenskjold and his wife, who accompanied him on his tour. Later in the evening an informal reception was held at the home of Dr. Andreen, where Dr. and Mrs. Nordenskjold were serenaded by the student body, bearing lighted torches.

During the afternoon the distinguished traveler and lecturer was driven from the Harper house to Rock Island arsenal, which he inspected with great interest.

Rock Island camp, No. 85, Woodmen of the World, recently organized in this city, held its second meeting last evening, and received a class of 17 candidates. The officers of the Davenport camp conducted the meeting.

Following the ceremonies at the lodge room, the members, to the number of 100, repaired to the Harms hotel, where an enjoyable banquet was served. Following the feast, a program of toasts was given, Harry McFarland, of Davenport, presiding as toastmaster. Among those who responded were Prof. V. O. Peterson, State Organizer W. J. Anderson of Chicago, Henry N. Hanson, A. P. McGuirk of Davenport, W. M. Walker, Dr. Lindsey of Davenport and F. H. Burgess.

The local camp is prospering and plans are being made for the organization of a camp in Moline in the near future.

LABOR CONGRESS EXTENDS VOTE OF THANKS TO BOARD

Wish Honored by Opening Public Library—Clinton Men Fail to Appear at Meeting.

At the regular meeting of the Tri-City Labor congress last evening a vote of thanks was tendered by the congress to the Rock Island library board for granting the organization's request to open the public library Sundays. At a recent meeting of the congress the opening of the library was discussed, and a committee appointed to confer with the library board in the matter. The board consented to open the library from 2 to 5 o'clock Sunday afternoons as an experiment, and to keep the building open Sundays as long as the attendance warrants.

The delegation from the Clinton congress, which was expected to be present last evening, failed to appear, to the great disappointment of the delegates in attendance. Last evening's meeting was the largest ever held by the labor congress, over 60 delegates being in attendance. Delegates were received and obligated from machinists' unions No. 388 and No. 83, and from the journeymen tailors' union, No. 278.

WILL NOT CHANGE

Postoffice Department Holds to Ruling Against Indianapolis Office.

WOODMEN MAY PUBLISH HERE

Paper Must Be Entered at Principal Place of Business—Either Rock Island or Lincoln.

According to the last ruling of the postoffice department The Modern Woodman, the official publication of the Modern Woodmen of America, will not be given the privilege of being entered as second class mail matter in the postoffice at Indianapolis, where it is now being printed. It may be necessary for the society to make arrangements to have the paper printed here, this being the principal place of its business.

F. O. Van Gilder, editor of the publication, has returned from Washington bringing the above information. He went there several days ago to get matters straightened out with the department, which had several weeks before ruled the matter out of the second class. As a similar ruling had been made before and reinstatement secured, it was thought that an explanation of the conditions and circumstances under which the publication is issued would suffice.

Principal Business Place.
The difficulty seems to be not with the class of the matter, but with the postoffice in which it is to be entered. For several years it has been printed in Lincoln, Neb., and was accepted there as second class. The ruling of the department is that it should be entered in the city where its place of business is located, which is Rock Island. While no decision was made in the matter it was thought by the department officers that it could be published at Lincoln, as the head consul of the society maintains an office there.

The board of directors was informed of the situation today by Mr. Van Gilder, but the members were inclined to take the matter up further with a view to getting the ruling reversed. What they dislike about the order is that the society is bound to one or, at the most, two cities in which this printing may be done. Thus if a plant was furnished in Rock Island for the publication of the paper, the society would almost be at the printer's mercy in the price to be charged.
