WAS SAME STORY

**Islanders Drop Second Game at
Peoria Though Excelling
in Field.**

TWO HOMERS BATTED OUT

**Asher Driven from Box in the Eighth
—All Other Losers of Thursday
Won Out.**

Peoria, May 5.—After piling up four
scores in the first inning, the Island-
ers were beaten out by the Distillers
in the second game of the cham-
pionship season, the score being 9 to 7.
Asher was batted out of the box in
the eighth, when McConnell's men
started in with the evident intention
of making a victorious finish and Wag-
ner was substituted. He proved in-
vincible.

Rock Island outplayed the home
team, particularly in the first inning,
when Buelow's colts did all sorts of
wooly things. Scott had rather the
best of the opposing slab artists and
undoubtedly would have won his game
had it not been for Hughes' homer in
the sixth with two on base.

Carlisle Hits for Four.

Carlisle, first up in the opening in-
ning, straightened out one for a homer.
A couple of errors by Raymond, a
walk to Swalm, and a single by Wil-
son added three more. A base on
balls and two hits, one a long one by
Buelow, gave Peoria two in their half.
A couple of walks and a hit by Egan
filled up the bases in the third for
Peoria and then Hughes sent through
another hit that tied up the score. Lev-
ings tallied in the next inning on a
single, sacrifice and a hit by Raymond.
It was in the sixth that Bewer walked,
Buelow went to base on Wanner's er-
ror and Hughes brought both and him-
self in with a fly over Swalm. Asher
got around in the seventh with a sin-
gle, sacrifice and fielder's choice.

Go After Asher.

In the meantime the Islanders were
doing nothing, but in the seventh a
walk to Ragan and singles by Swalm
and Wanner gave two runs. In the
eighth McConnell singled and Carlisle
and Forney, who had taken Ragan's
place in that inning, walked and with
the bases full and one out, Wagner
was sent in. He retired the side with-
out a run. In the ninth with one out
and Vandine on second, Spencer
caught a high foul and doubled the
