WANT IT REMOVED

Telephone Company Would Take
Quo Warranto Case to
Federal Court.

OBJECTIONS BY MOLINE

Motion by Company in Circuit Court—
Mackin Case Commenced—Orders
Entered on Docket.

An effort is being made by the Central Union Telephone company to have the case in quo warranto against it in the circuit court here brought by the city of Moline, transferred to the federal court at Peoria. A motion was made in the circuit court yesterday afternoon by W. B. Mann and McEniry & McEniry, attorneys for the company, for the removal, on the ground that the quo warranto suit of the city involves a federal question, and that the circuit court consequently is without jurisdiction. The objections of the city to the removal were filed by S. R. Kenworthy, of Kenworthy & Kenworthy, who are assisting City Attorney G. A. Shalberg in the telephone case. The objections are that the case is not properly removable, that the petition is insufficient, that the bond is not sufficient, that it does not appear by the papers in court that the federal court has either original jurisdiction or jurisdiction on removal, and that there is no federal question involved. Argument on the motion will be heard as soon as the case can be reached.

Jury Is Completed.

The selection of the jury in the case of the Mackin will contest was completed this morning, and the completed jury which will try the case is composed of Carlstedt, Mike Kehoe, August Kranz, L. P. Nelson, Theodore Morchhead, Leo Fuller, Otis Cronk, Fred Bruckman, J. S. Rogers, John Ulmark, H. H. Carlin, and Dan Schroeder. The opening statements of the attorneys were made today, and the hearing of the testimony in the case commenced in the afternoon. A large amount of evidence is to be heard, and the trial will probably continue for over two weeks.

GOVERNMENT INVITES BIDS TO CARRY MAIL

New Contract for Service in Rock Island to Be in Effect July 1, 1907.

Proposals for carrying the United States mail in regulation screen wagons at Rock Island, for a term of four years, commencing July 1, 1907, are now being invited by the postoffice department. Under the regulations no proposals will be considered unless the person submitting the bid shall agree in his contract to personally supervise the service and to reside in or contiguous to the route. Bidders are required to furnish bonds for \$4,500 to accompany the bids. Blanks for proposals, form of contract, specifications for wagons and other necessary information will be furnished upon application to Hugh A. J. McDonald, postmaster. All bids must be at the office of the second assistant postmaster general at Washington, D. C., on or before Dec. 4.

CHARGE SHORTAGE

Members of Investigating Committee Say Deceased Clerk
Owed the County.

AMOUNT PLACED AT \$20,000

Frank G. Welton's Accounts as County Clerk Being Examined By an Expert Accountant.

According to members of the Henry County Vigilance committee, a shortage in excess of \$20,000 has been found in the accounts of the late Frank G. Welton, for 37 years county clerk. J. C. Grabbe of Davenport, the expert accountant engaged in making an investigation of the accounts of the deceased clerk, is said to have given the opinion that the discrepancies amounted to "more than \$15,000," and his basis of estimate was only the fees collected from the county by Mr. Welton. The investigation was commenced Sept. 5, and three days later Mr. Welton died, the cause of death being given by the family physician as pneumonia. It is now believed that the investigation was responsible for Mr. Welton's death.

Politics in Case.

Owing to the prominence of Mr. Welton, politically, the sentiment is divided along political lines as to the investigation and the possible charges of graft. A. H. Linn and Frank H. Streed are the leaders of the investigating committee, which is composed for the most part of men who opposed Mr. Welton politically. Mr. Streed is a brother of John Streed, the lawyer whose mysterious death caused such a sensation a year ago. Mr. Streed's relatives asserted that he had been murdered, and ill feeling was caused by the statement of some that he had suicided. Mr. Welton was among the latter, and the enmity between him and Frank Streed is well known. It is said that aside from the committee of 15, all of the political leaders in the county assert Welton's innocence.

An Independent Investigation.

An independent investigation, aside from that of the vigilance committee, is planned by the friends of the clerk, and Mrs. Ella Welton, the clerk's widow, has had the county board of supervisors order an inquiry. The request states that Mr. Welton himself had planned to ask the board for such an inquiry, but was buried the day before the meeting. The board has passed a resolution that it will not take cognizance of the investigation by the vigilance committee.

The shortages are alleged to be in his accounts of fees collected by the office for licenses, papers in estates, etc.

Mrs. M. A. Snider, 109 Fifteenth street, died yesterday afternoon at 12:30 at St. Anthony's hospital of typhoid fever after a brief illness. She was 32 years of age, and was born in Russia. She is survived by her husband and three children, Belle, Ida, and Simon, and two brothers, A. Morichnick and S. Morichnick, who reside in this city. Burial took place yesterday afternoon at 5 o'clock at the Jewish cemetery in Davenport.

Nelson.

John Nelson, one of the early settlers of Carbon Cliff, died at his home in that town yesterday of apoplexy. He was seized with an apoplectic stroke last Saturday and rapidly grew worse until death ended his sufferings. He was in his 66th year. He leaves a widow and six children. The children are: Rev. A. J. Nelson, Mrs. Nellie Gerhardt, David Nelson, Mrs. Susan Corbin, John Nelson and Mrs. Fannie Hushman.
