CHARGE SHORTAGE

mittee Say Deceased Clerk Owed the County.

Frank G. Welton's Accounts as County Clerk Being Examined By an Expert Accountant,

According to members of the Henry County Vigilance committee, a shortige in excess of \$20,000 has been found in the accounts of the late Frank G. Welton, for 37 years county clerk. J. C. Grabbe of Davenport, the expert accountant engaged in making an investigation of the accounts of the deceased clerk, is said to have given the opinion that the discrepancies amountd to "more than \$15,000," and his basis of estimate was only the fees collected from the county by Mr. Welton. The investigation was commenced Sept. 5, and three days later Mr. Welton died, the cause of death being given by the family physician as pneu monia. It is now believed that the in vestigation was responsible for Mi Welton's death

Polities in Case.

Owing to the prominence of Mr. Welon, politically, the sentiment is divided along political lines as to the in-INSURANCE RISK vestigation and the possible charges of graft. A. H. Linn and Frank H. Streed are the leaders of the investgating committee, which is composed for the most part of men who opposed Mr. Welton politically. Mr. Streed is a brother of John Streed, the lawyer whose mysterious death caused such a sensation a year ago. Mr. Streed's murdered, and ill feeling was caused C. W.
