SUIT IS SETTLED

**Stella Grady Gets \$1,000 in Civil
Action Against the McKin-
neys of Aledo.**

IS NOT BROUGHT TO TRIAL

Had Sued for \$10,000 Damages Result-
ing from Alleged Injuries
Inflicted.

The announcement is made at Aledo that the \$10,000 damage suit of Stella Grady against Mr. and Mrs. Archibald McKinney has been settled out of court, the plaintiff getting \$1,000. This seems to close the final incident in the celebrated cruelty case as a result of which Mrs. McKinney was adjudged insane and is still confined at the Watertown hospital.

The suit was filed last January as a sequel to the criminal prosecution of Mrs. McKinney, who was charged with criminal cruelty toward Miss Grady, who was her orphan ward. The suit was entered in the name of Miss Margaret Gilmore, now Mrs. George Welding, of Aledo. Graham and Thomson represented Miss Grady, but March 21 they withdrew and Judge Connell of Aledo, and Judge C. J. Searle of Rock Island entered the suit as representative of Miss Grady on March 22. The declaration was filed on March 23. At the same time Cooke, Wilson & McArthur took charge of the case for the McKinneys, and at the April term asked a change of venue. This was argued but nothing was decided.

All Claims Released.
The agreement which has now been filed releases the defendants from all claims of action, and agrees to dismiss the suit at the December term of court on the grounds of the cause of the action being satisfied.

BOOST FOR FOOTBALL GAME

Show Girl Troupe Will Parade Streets
Thursday Morning.
