

# SHREVE IS LOSER

### Port Byron Man's Wife Gets Divorce and Damage Suit is Dismissed.

### ENDS PECULIAR ROMANCE

#### Couple Married in Moline in 1904 and Never Lived Together as Husband and Wife.

The sensational suit of Clyde Shreve of Port Byron, against Matthew Wilson, a prosperous Scott county farmer for \$10,000 for alienation of the affections of the former's wife, and the suit of the wife for divorce were settled at one and the same time before Judge Bollinger in the Scott county district court yesterday. The woman, who is a daughter of Wilson, is given divorce and the right to resume her maiden name, and the action for damages was dismissed.

The romance is one of the most peculiar that has been brought to light recently. Shreve married Miss Wilson in Moline, May 16, 1904, but the couple never lived together as husband and wife. The father of the bride took a hand in the game immediately after the ceremony was performed and compelled his daughter to return home, where she has remained since.

#### Kept Out in Cold.

The groom tried every means at his command to secure the good graces of the "old man" but failed ignominiously, and finally entered suit for damages. The case never came to trial, and in the meantime the wife filed action for divorce, alleging statutory grounds.

#### Auto Tourists Complete Trip to City of Mexico by Train.

After successfully running from Boston to within 50 miles of the city of Mexico, Charles J. Glidden, millionaire of Boston and famous for long distance automobile runs, who passed through this city in his Napier motor car, Thursday, Nov. 22, was forced to abandon his vehicle owing to a wreck and to finish his trip aboard a train. Mr. Glidden's arrival in Mexico City was the practical completion of a tour of the United States and Mexico, which is part of the "stunt" of journeying 50,000 miles in a motor car in 50 countries in a single decade which he is bent on performing. Egypt is the next country to be toured, though there will likely be some delay because his car is at present wrecked in a ditch near Teocacalco, Mexico. ### DAVENPORTER ONE OF A PEARY PARTY

#### Pictures of Views in Greenland Now Seen at Academy of Sciences.

George R. Putnam of Davenport, was one of the members of one of the Peary parties to Greenland, a few years ago, accompanying the famous explorer by special permission of the coast survey, with which Mr. Putnam has long been identified. He took the magnetic observations on the trip. The kayak, clothed figures of esquimaux adults and children, and other striking arctic features of the Davenport Academy of Sciences, are relics of that trip secured and forwarded by Mr. Putnam. The latter, now in Washington, was one of the guests there at the recent brilliant function, at which Commander Peary was presented by President Roosevelt with the Hubbard medal for noteworthy achievement in exploration.

Members of the Academy of Sciences and many citizens have expressed their approval of the action of the Tri-City Press club in arranging for a lecture at the Burtis Jan. 11 by Commander Peary. Davenport is probably the only city of its size which will get the lecture. New York, Brooklyn, Washington, Baltimore and Chicago are the few cities that are known to have secured his promise to tell his story. Prominent in the navy department, Commander Peary is not on the lecture platform except by special permission in the belief that the telling of his story in a few prominent cities is for the good of the service and the country at large. The tri-cities are especially favored in being able to secure him.

Ex-Mayor C. A. Ficke of Davenport, president of the Academy of Sciences, will introduce Commander Peary on his appearance in Davenport.

#### Harry Swickard Saved From Death by Son's Quick Action at Alpha.

Conductor Harry Swickard, who has charge of the coal run on the Burlington between Viola and Barstow, had an exceedingly close call yesterday while switching at Alpha. He was standing on the pilot of the engine, when his foot slipped and he fell between the rails. His son, Arthur, who was standing in the cab, saw the accident, and grabbing the reverse lever, brought the locomotive to a stop in a few feet. When Mr. Swickard was extricated it was found that his leg was broken and he had been badly bruised, but had miraculously escaped with his life. His clothing was torn and ground where it had come in contact with the wheels. He was taken to his home in Galesburg.
