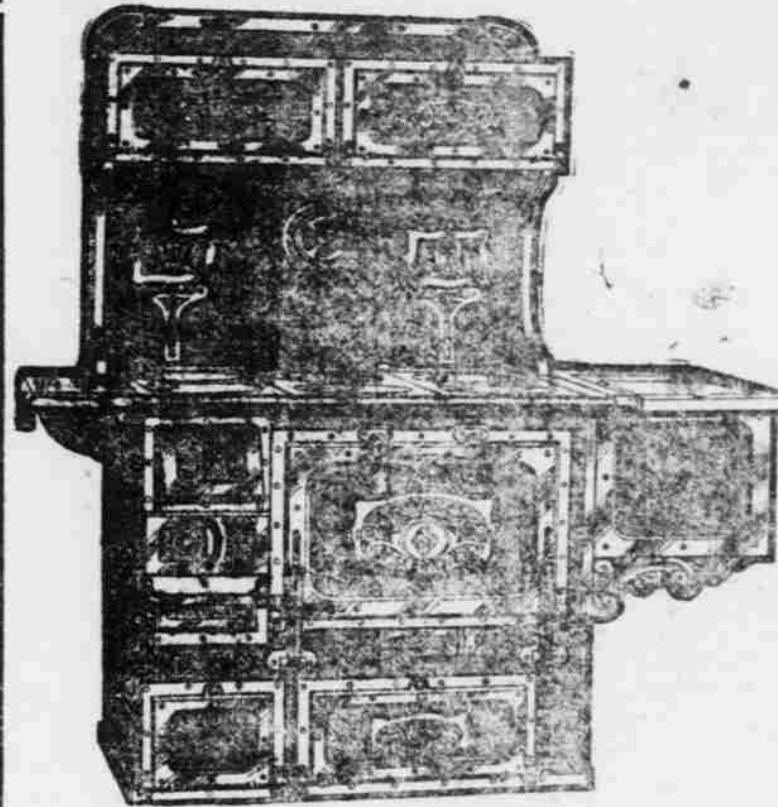

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Alderman McNeely moved that the bill of the People's Power company for \$638.90 be referred to the finance and waterworks committees. Carried.

The clerk read reports of various city officers for the month of February, which, on motion, were received and ordered filed.

The clerk read petitions to open paving to connect sewer, and for the extension of sewers and water mains. Referred, on motion of Alderman McNeely, to the sewer and waterworks committees, with power to act.

The mayor read a report stating that Dr. Magnuson of Augustana college is willing to act as city bacteriologist for one month at a salary of \$75 a month, his compensation to be permanently fixed at the end of that period. Alderman McNeely

moved that the report be received and adopted. Carried.

The mayor read a report from Orrin S. Holt as inspector on the filter construction work. Alderman Frank moved that the report be not received and that when the council adjourn it be to tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock, to inspect the filter plant. Carried.

The mayor read a petition from property owners asking that the proceedings for the construction of the east section of the Seventh ward sewer system be begun at once. Alderman McNeely moved that the board be authorized to incur the necessary expense in sending out notices to begin the proceedings. Carried.

The mayor read a petition from property owners urging action in relation to the purchase of a site for a new hose house on the hill in the Seventh ward. Alderman Borst moved the petition be received and referred to the special committee on the purchase of a site. Carried.

Alderman Borst presented a resolution recommending that in the next annual appropriation ordinance

that \$10 be refunded to Emil Frank on his assessment for the Sixth ward sewer system. Adopted by unanimous vote.

Alderman LaVanway submitted the following resolution, which was adopted by unanimous vote:

Whereas, an exigency exists by reason of a lack of funds in the city treasury of the city of Rock Island, Ill., for the payment of overdue, current and anticipated bills and salaries and for the conduct of the business of said city of Rock Island, including the maintenance of

A sufficient sum be set aside for the purchase of a site for a fire station in the Seventh ward on the hill and for equipping and maintaining such a fire station. Adopted.

Alderman Huff from the sewer committee reported that in the matter of the assessment against property of Clarence Ritchie and L. McGinnis on the Sixth ward sewer system, the assessment of \$30 is reasonable, and that they be notified to pay \$30 on the lots in front of which sewer has been laid. Adopted by unanimous vote.

Alderman Huff from the sewer committee reported recommending

that \$10 be refunded to Emil Frank on his assessment for the Sixth ward sewer system. Adopted by unanimous vote.

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
