### 600 DELEGATES EXPECTED

Half of These Will Be Ladies Who Have Their Separate Social Organization.

Dolly has extended an invitation to the entire delegation to be his guests at an afternoon performance at the Empire, and the final afternoon a grand steamboar excursion on the Mississippi will wind up the affair.
