HEAD OFFICERS ENDORSED

Hancock County Delegation Registers Only Protest-Unable to Agree With Either Side.

after the administration delegates had been seated at Knights of Columbus hall O. E. Aleshire, floor leader. called to order. Edward D. Reynolds of Rockford was named as state consal and C. Edwin Johnson of Paxton

as state clerk. "It is time for a state convention to be held by men who know how," said Mr. Reynolds on taking the chair. He sided that they were assembled to hold a "fraternal" convention. "I have been in state camps for 15 years and not until today have our rights as lodgemen been taken from us so il-

legally," he said. Dr. C. E. Orr, of La Salle, placed a motion which carried, that a committee of five be appointed on credentials. One member of the order from each county in which there was a contest was also asked to meet with the credentials committee, which was composed of Rev. Osceola McNemar, El Paso; John Dowd, Chicago; W. E. L. Fox. Thompsonville: Grant Taylor, Flat Rock; and B F. Quigg, Minier.

Is No Dissent.

The committee on credentials seated delegates without a dissenting vote on the adoption of the report. The chair next called for a selection of head camp delegates by congressional districts. While this was being done James McNamara of Rock Island moved the appointment of three members of a resolutions committee. N. F. Hart, Peoria: F. O. Van Galder, Rock Island; and George McIntyre, Chicago, members of the committee, returned a report endorsing head officers' records and endorsing the faction's candidates to go before the head camp. The management of the order's business and its stand in the rate war issue was upheld. The resolutions appear elsewhere in this issue.

W. H. Hartsell of Carthage rose to state that Hancock county did not approve of the adoption of the resolutions committee's report. He said:

"Hancock county is meeting with this body because we think you are better than the insurgents. We don't endorse the head officers' records during the past three years in view of mistaken. We do not believe in riot and would not go with the insurgents. That the present head officers have made a mistake is apparent to us, but we think it was an honest mistake. We have no doubt of their integrity, despite the fact that they have cost the order \$200,000 in the past three years. All we ask is that the officers do not repeat the act."

Mr. Aleshire was on his feet quick-"I am glad to hear from the neighbor from my old home county." he said. "I appreciate what he has said and am glad to recognize him as a member of this convention body." Mr. Aleshire concluded that it would be his desire to fulfill the wish of Mr.

Meet In Chicago Next.

As the resolutions did not recommend the convention city for the order three years hence F. O. Van Galder invited discussion of that matter. Delerates from Galesburg and Chicago asked that the convention be voted to those cities. S. E. Davis of Galesburg suggested that Rock Island again be voted the convention city. Mr. Aleshire was a booster for Chicago and that city was voted the next convention by a large majority in a standing




