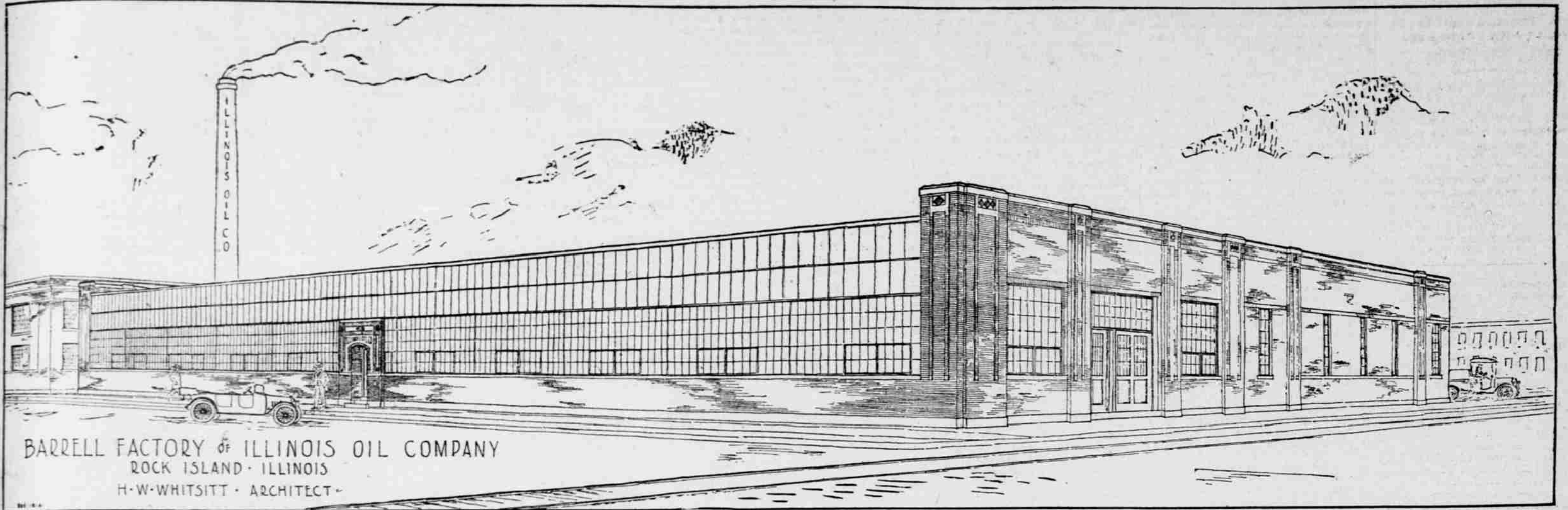

CHARLES JOHNSON MURDER JURY TO GET OFF HOLIDAY

Unusual Procedure of Allowing Men to Spend Thanksgiving at Home Allowed.

BOTH SIDES AGREE TO IT

Charles E. Johnson on Trial for the Life of John Lindgren, Deceased Moline Flagman.

One would presume that the jury now being secured in the Johnson murder case in circuit court would have to undergo the vexation of being away from their families and homes on Thanksgiving day, but even though the law is strict relative to the jury system and the need of shutout from the outside world, there are human elements in the court house, and jurymen likely will be permitted to spend Thanksgiving with their families.

morning this will be permitted. Mr. Thompson stated that he had discussed the matter with Attorney Gus Shalberg, who represents the defendant, Charles E. Johnson, Moline, and that he has agreed to consent to the men being given the privilege of being with their families.

Mr. Thompson stated that where the attorneys for both sides got together and agreed upon such action that it was usually permitted by the court.

The venire of jurymen reported at 2 o'clock this afternoon and work on securing the jury started. It is thought that by tomorrow the twelve men will be secured and then the case will go to trial.

It is very likely that by Wednesday afternoon it will not be concluded. Ordinarily the jury would have to be housed up over Thanksgiving day but since an adjournment will be taken from Wednesday afternoon until Friday morning, it was thought in justice to the men they should not be deprived of the holiday at home.

They will be given strict instructions relative to their actions while not in custody of the deputy sheriff and they will be expected to discuss the case with no one.

Charles E. Johnson, formerly head of one of the departments of the Central Union Telephone company, is on trial, on a charge of murder, the grand jury of the term of September, 1913, having indicted him on three counts, it being charged that he ran down John E. Lindgren, a flagman at the Fifteenth street crossing of the Rock Island lines in Moline. It is alleged that a wound was inflicted which caused the death of Lindgren one month later.

SAVES HUBBY BY PLEAS AND CRIES

Wife of Dominick Vicioni, the Wielder of Butcher Knife, Gets Him Off Lightly.

Following a touching scene in police court this morning in which Mrs. Dominick Vicioni and four children bid goodbye to the head of their family, Vicioni was taken in county court to answer charges that he wielded a butcher knife in true western fashion in a Fourth avenue saloon ten days ago. He was fined \$1 and costs and committed to the county jail for five days by Judge B. S. Bell.

In police court Dominick's wife and children thought the end had come for the husband and father, and his wife cried hysterically, appealing to Police Magistrate C. J. Smith to save Dominick.

Vicioni was released by the police magistrate and information was filed against him in county court. On account of his wife and family the charge was amended from assault with a deadly weapon, to assault and battery.

Andrew Larson, who some time ago was arrested by the local police for stealing an overcoat in a rooming house on Second avenue, near Sixteenth street, this morning was made defendant on information filed in county court by State's Attorney Floyd Thompson, the charge being larceny. It is understood that Larson will plead guilty, friends having come to his aid to pay the fine which the court will inflict upon him.
