

NEW STORE AND OTHER WORK IN BUILDING BOOM

Construction Work Continued. Re-
gardless of Weather—E. H.
Geyer to Erect Store.

Five building permits were is-
sued during the past week by John
A. Lindros, city building inspector.
The work estimated to cost \$11,876.
The largest project is that of an

\$2,000 dwelling to be erected at
1846 Perry street by the
Borghardt Construction company
for C. K. Borghardt.
The next largest project is a fil-
ling station to cost \$3,500 to be
erected by the Standard Oil com-
pany at 1045 Twelfth street.
Austin Mills was given a permit
to remodel his store building at 265
Twenty-second street. The work is
estimated to cost \$200.
The Community club was granted
a permit to build a partition at
club rooms in the State bank build-
ing. The work is estimated to cost
\$75.
S. L. Gelwick was granted a per-
mit to raise a store building belong-
ing to E. H. Geyer and situated at
1936 Third avenue. This work is
to cost \$100.
In a statement to The Argus to-

day Mr. Geyer said that work will
be started on the erection of a
\$14,000 2-story brick store building
on the site as soon as the old build-
ing is torn down.
A permit was refused Mr. Geyer
several months ago to remodel the
present building and he announced
today that he has decided to tear
the old building down and erect a
modern structure.
