THE WHEELS MOVING.

PRESIDENT CLEVELAND BUSILY EN-GAGED IN CLEARING UP HIS WORK.

Getting Ready for the Annual Message His Silver Policy-Coinage of the Silver Dollar To Be Stopped-Important Vacancy.

WASHINGTON CITY, Sept. 9.-Within two hours from the time the president reached the executive mansion, he was at his desk in the library, busily engaged clearing up current work, which had accumulated during his four weeks' absence

Although nothing is pending of imms-diate national importance, the fact that the president has returned safe and well and is again domicided at the White House seems to enliven everything and everybody at the capital. The return of Secretary Manning helps to fill the abhorrent vacuum of the past month, and so soon as his associates of the cabinet shall reappear at their posts of duty the wheels of government will move on at an accelerated pace and the administration be fully panoplied for the ensuing congressional campaign. In addition to various matters laid aside by the president for determination after his return, there are many important appointments await-ing his approval, and in a few days, at furthest, the pilgrimage of office-seekers from all sections will be vigorously renewed. Senators and congressmen will reappear at short redice, and the battle for the spoils, temporarily suspended during the dog days, be resumed. While there are no new developments concerning the Chito new developments concerning the Car-cago internal revenue collectorship it may be safely assumed that the president will settle this vexed question and get rid of it within a few days. There are but lifteen internal revenue collectorships yet to be dis-posed of, some of which, however, are mak-

ng as much trouble as that of Chicago.
