YOUR UNCLE AHEAD.

THE WHITE-WINGED RACERS SHOW THEIR METTLE AT LAST.

Boston's Pride Leads from the Start and Comes in with Victory on Her Prow—One Point for Uncle Sam.

CHICAGO, Sept. 15.—The following dispatches were received from New York, describing the great international yacht race between the Puritan and Genesta.

SANDY HOOK, N. J., Sept. 14.—The sea off Sandy Hook is smooth this morning. The wind, which at dawn was blowing from the southward, is now (12 m.) a ten-mile breeze. The bay is dotted with yachts and vapors and white sails.

SANDY HOOK, Sept. 14.—The fleet behind the racers extends from shore to shore and rounding the point, and outside the Narrows, until the racers and attendant fleet had passed seaward.

SANDY HOOK, Sept. 14.—The Puritan has passed buoy 4, off Sandy Hook point, at 1:52 p. m. The Genesta passed the same buoy at 1:59.

PORT HAMILTON, Sept. 14.—The yachts are heading south on the port tack. The wind is southwest and only three miles an hour. The Puritan leads the Genesta about a quarter of a mile.

1:40 p. m.—There is a breeze coming up from the south-outward. The yachts felt it. They are both on the port tack. The Genesta keeps nearly two miles astern of the Puritan.

1:30 p. m.—The Puritan has passed buoy 5, off Sandy Hook point, at 1:32 p. m. The Genesta passed the same buoy at 1:38.

4:03 p. m.—Both racers are now about 1 1/2 miles below lower quarantine running free before the wind. The Puritan has not yet set her spinnaker but seems to be holding her own all right.

4:43 p. m.—The Puritan and Genesta are on the port tack. The Puritan keeps her position to the windward. It looks from here as though the Puritan went too far to the windward in rounding the light-ship, and, consequently, lost considerable ground. The Genesta is overhauling her manly rapidly than on the outward course.

4:55 p. m.—The Puritan has just set her spinnaker and it draws. The Puritan has not yet set her spinnaker but seems to be holding her own all right.

5:00 p. m.—The Puritan and Genesta are on the port tack. The Puritan keeps her position to the windward. It looks from here as though the Puritan went too far to the windward in rounding the light-ship, and, consequently, lost considerable ground.
