

the M. E. Folks Will Hold Their Last

Bervice in the Old Church Tomorrow ... Historical. Tomorrow the coagregation of the First M. E. church will worship for the

last time in the edifice at the corner of Fifth avenue and Nineteen street, where services have for so long been held. In the morning Rev. G. W. Gue will preach a sermon appropriate to the occasion and the Lord's supper will be administered to the pioneers of the church, or so many of them as can be present on this important

In the evening there will be a service of song and a testimony meeting. The Sabbath school will also meet for the last time in the old building tomorrow. A mere outline of the history of the church and congregation will be read with interest in this connection:

The first mention of the records of the church at large of an appointment a Rock Island, is in the minutes of the Illinois conference of 1831, a conference then comprising the entire state. Rock Island is named as a mission, to which Philip D. Cordie is assigned, and in cluded in the Quincy district, with Peter Cartwright as presiding elder. The ministers from then to 1836 were: John F. The present church building, the one o which the congregation will bid affecionate adieu tomorrow, was proected in 1834, under the pastorate of Rev. William Tasker, and the first conference in Rock Island was held at the church in September of that year, Bishop James presiding. The dedication took place April 20, 1856. The first board of stewards was composed of Michael Hartzell, John Metzgar, W. T. Basher, J. W. Spencer, Amos Moore, Morgan Ferguson and John Tindall. The first board of trustees: W. C. Cropper, Wm. Bell, Chas. H. Case, John W. Van Zant, J. W. Spencer, W. T. Brasher and Daniel Rough. The first recording steward was Michael Hartzell.

The present board of trustees is com posed of T. J. Robinson, E. D. Sweeney, C. H. Stoddard, J. H. Wilson, Wm Jackson, Dr. C. B. Kinyon, J. F. Robinon, Wm. Jackson and Dr. Geo. E. Barth. The present pastor, Rev. G. W. 
