THE ENCAMPMENT  
will last a week. About 2,000 soldiers will be on hand. The Second brigade, unlike the First, is made up of companies scattered all over the state and comprising the Fourth, Fifth and Sixth regiments. A good deal of attention will be given to rifle practice, and the Sixth regiment will use the rifle range Aug. 12 to 15. All the tents are up and everything was ready for the encampment when the boys arrived this morning.

This year the Illinois law-makers and the militia commanders made brigade encampments the rule. It is a new wrinkle so far as the past few years are concerned, but is likely to be a popular one. It gets men by the hundred from every part of the state in camp at once and it makes in truth a small army. The First brigade has been through the mill and gave Camp Lincoln a trial two weeks ago. The Second will pitch tents today for a week's stay.

General orders No. 5 has been issued by Brigadier General Barkley and commands the officers of the Fourth, Fifth and Sixth regiments to report at Camp Lincoln on Tuesday, August 11.

The general orders tell what each man must take with him. He must wear the service uniform, be fully equipped and carry with him the blanket bag, haversack, canteen, meat can, knife, fork, spoon and tin cup. The blanket, neatly folded, will be carried inside the blanket bag, and the overcoat, neatly rolled, will be strapped in its proper place on the blanket bag. White gloves will be worn on duty and during ceremonies in camp.

### Valuable Shares of Stock.

W. J. Young & Co. are credited with having purchased the two shares in the Mississippi River Logging company heretofore owned by the Schulenberg & Boeckeler Lumber company. The price paid is said to be \$390,000. The Mississippi River Logging company was organized a number of years ago, to purchase the property and privileges of operating Beef Slough and the Chippewa river. It was more an association of lumbermen than a company, the members pooling their issues. From that time the stock has steadily grown in value until it is now estimated as being worth nearly \$200,000 a share. There are 41 shares divided between 10 lumbering concerns, W. J. Young & Co., Weyerhaeuser & Denkmann, Rock Island Lumber company, Peter Musser, Ben Hershey, Lamb & Sons, David Joyce, Laird-Norton company, Winona Lumber company, and Youman Brothers & Hodgins. W. J. Young is the heaviest owner, holding nine shares, Fred Weyerhaeuser next with seven shares, The Schulenberg & Boeckeler Lumber company are gradually curtailing their operations at St. Louis and it will not be at all surprising if they should cease manufacturing at that point altogether.

Last season he caught 96 out of 112 games for the Monmouth club. This season, including today, he has caught 79 games and expected to catch every game to the close of the season had he not signed with the Browns. He is tall built, on the Jack Boyle order, is quick and throws well to bases. He is a left handed batter. He is glad of the opportunity to get on the Browns, where he will be benefitted by Comiskey's skillful directions.

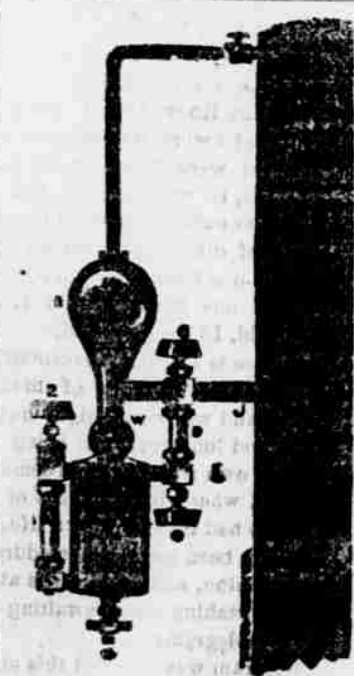
