The colleagues of Mayor McConochie on the republican ticket, tacitly admit that the head of the ticket is hopelessly snowed under, but have slight hopes of their own individual success. They all realize, however, that Slippery Bill is a heavy load to carry, and there is a groan all along the line. The auditing board of the town of Rock Island, composed of Supervisor Conrad Schneider, Justices S. F. Cooke and David Hawes and City Clerk Robert Koehler, met in annual session at 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon. Bills were allowed as follows: Conrad Schneider, treasurer's fees, \$27.85; Robert Koehler, clerk's fees, \$5.85; fees on sparrow bounty, \$30.75; and for one day's service of auditing board, \$6. A contemptible piece of underhanded campaign work in the past few days has been an attempt to spread a report that T. J. Medill was not a resident of Rock Island but of Milan. F. Schroeder's friends held in the Second ward, the purpose of which was to induce Mr. Schroeder to withdraw from the republican ticket. The Union to the contrary notwithstanding, no meeting was held at Roche's hall, and Mr. Roche has a cool hundred dollars ready for anyone who can prove there was. If the Union had any reliable assurances that such a meeting was held, it would lay claim to that \$100 about as quick as it could get its hands on it. Still Trading. One candidate affected went to McConochie with the matter, and the mayor, to his surprise, sat down and coolly explained that the manipulation was the work of Koehler, who was expecting to profit by securing the election of certain candidates on the democratic ticket.
