### 136 Homestead Entries.

Santa Fe.—According to Receiver Fred Muller, 136 original homestead entries covering 15,205 acres, were made in the Santa Fe land office, one of six in New Mexico, last month. Other entries increased the total entries to 40,000 acres.

### Territorial Auditor's Statement.

Santa Fe.—Traveling Auditor Joerns issued an annual statement for the building and loan associations of New Mexico, whose resources are given as \$1,331,293 of which \$1,913,556 are loans on real estate, \$45,752 loans on stock, \$26,029 cash on hand and \$45,000 buildings and fixtures.

### Fatal Gasoline Stove.

Albuquerque.—Another life has been snuffed out by the deadly gasoline stove. Mrs. Pacifico Baldasarri tried to light the gasoline stove in her kitchen, when a mass of flame shot up, ignited her clothing and resulted in burns which proved fatal and causing a fire in the two-room adobe dwelling which gutted the interior.

### Highwaymen Were "Tenderfeet."

Santa Rita.—It is not a discovery that aids the wounded feelings or the posse disarmed by the bandits, but the officers now believe that the three masked men who held up the Chino Copper Company officials and later on the posse of Constable Portwood near this place, were tenderfeet highwaymen fresh from the states, not used to either horses or firearms.

### New Oil Concern Incorporates.

Gallup.—With a capital of \$200,000, the Gallup Independent Oil Company, with offices at Gallup, filed incorporation papers. The incorporators and directors are F. B. Maple, B. F. Zahm, C. A. Leavitt, P. N. Griego, Martin Gield, J. A. Sneddon, A. F. Ries, Alfred Ruiz, C. M. Sabin, E. M. Sanjule, C. C. Manning, William T. Cochran, C. L. Gonzales, Fred Netz, Elmer Wilson, H. G. Wilson and Benjamin F. Wilson.

### Fees Falling Off.

Santa Fe.—The announcement of Territorial Secretary Jaffa to the officials of the capitol that the incorporation fees for the last fiscal year were less than one-half those of the year preceding, were almost startling. The total receipts for the last fiscal year having been less than for the third quarter of the year preceding. The total was \$7,569.10 as against \$17,511.86 the year before. One hundred and fifty-eight domestic corporations with a total capitalization of \$35,684,000 were organized during the fiscal year, as against 219, with an authorized capitalization of \$101,133,725, the year before.

### Mexican Commits Horrible Crime.

Springer.—With evidences of a struggle in the interior of the house, Mrs. Jacob Karlin, the wife of a prominent and wealthy ranchman, was found murdered in her home on the Jaritas, sixteen miles east of the city. Her skull had been crushed in with an ax. The body was found in the second story, where she had climbed in her efforts to elude the assassin. Five bullet holes were also found in the body, one in the right temple, one in the heart, in the left side and right wrist. Mrs. Karlin was alone at the time, her youngest daughter having gone to the postoffice, about five miles distant. A nineteen-year-old Mexican was arrested and later confessed to the crime.
