EDITORIAL New Retirement Test Law Benefits Some Over 65

Heeding the slogan "Don't delay, check today" could
very well put some social security payments in your pocket,
according to Benjamin D. Waechter, District Manager of the
Downtown-Detroit Social Security Office. This slogan
was made especially meaningful by Congress when it passed
the new retirement test law. Basically, this law allows
many persons over 65 to receive some social security pay-
ments even though their earnings are substantially in
excess of \$1200 a year.

The new provisions are effective with 1961 and pro-
vide that \$1 of the total social security benefits payable to
a family during a year be withheld for every \$2 the old-
age beneficiary earns between \$1200 and \$1700. Deduc-
tions for earnings in excess of \$1700 will be on a dollar for
dollar basis. Perhaps an example of how this works will
explain it better.

Let us suppose that John earns \$3000 a year. He
has had this job for years at the same salary and wants to
continue. On the basis of a \$3000 a year salary, his month-
ly social security check at 65 will be \$95. His wife at 65
will receive 1/2 of her husband's benefit or \$47.50—total
monthly benefits to both—\$142.50.

In this example, if John retired and kept his earnings
under \$1200 a year, he and his wife could receive checks
for all 12 months of the year, of \$1710; but John wants to
continue his \$3000 a year job. Can he receive any social
security payments? We'll apply the test and see.

Step 1. Since John is earning over \$1200 a year, he
and his wife will not be able to receive the full \$1710.

Step 2. For the first \$500 he earns over \$1200, a de-
duction of \$250 must be made. \$149 for each \$200 earned.
Subtracting the \$250 from the \$1710 leaves \$1460.

Step 3. Since his total earnings are \$1300 over the
\$1700, we must subtract an additional \$1300 dollar for
dollar from the \$1460 remaining from Step 2. This leaves
\$160, the amount of social security payments due John and
his wife for the year.

John and his wife received some social security bene-
fits for the year. Maybe you can too. Head the slogan
"don't delay, check today," with your nearest social secu-
rity office. Every employed person over 65 who has not
already done so should visit his social security office to find
out if he can collect some benefits.

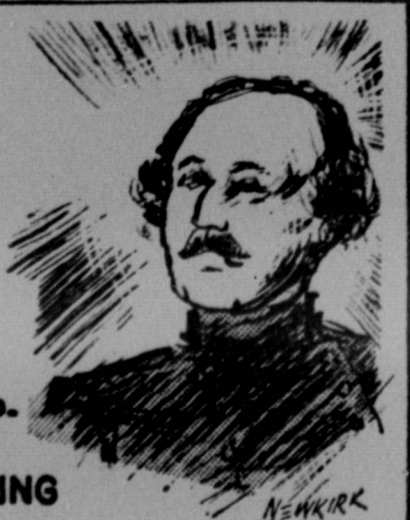

The GOVERNOR Writes

LANSING — House Bill 763
appropriating funds for general
operation of state government
became law Monday, July 23,
without my signature.

This is the bill that contains
language dedicating that salaries
of state senators and representa-
tives will be increased from \$5,000
to \$7,000 a year beginning next
January 1.

This is a rammed bill. It is
impossible to make it impossible
for me to veto the 40 per cent
raise the legislators voted for
themselves. The bill does not pro-
vide any funds now for that pay
raise, so there is no appropri-
ation for me to veto — if that
pay raise appropriation was there,
I would not allow it to become
law. I would veto it.

One paragraph of the bill
states that the raise will go into
effect next year when, presum-
ably, the Legislature will vote the
money to pay for it.

I have had exhaustive research
conducted to determine whether
it would be possible for me to
veto that pay raise clause alone.
All legal opinions indicate that
this language cannot be singled
out for rejection — that the only
way the pay raise could be vetoed
would be to veto the entire bill
which provides funds for opera-
tion of all general government
functions. This I cannot do. To
veto the entire bill would be
to shut down all general govern-
ment services to the people un-
til such time as other legisla-
tion could be enacted.

I do not question that legisla-
tive salaries should be higher
than they should be sufficient
to attract and hold the most
qualified people we can get in
the Legislature. But it is not
consistent for legislators to vote
down appropriations adequate to
meet the needs of the people —

and then vote up a 40 per cent
pay raise for themselves.
The representatives of the peo-
ple certainly are not more im-
portant than the people they
represent. As long as the needs
of the people remain unfulfilled,
those of the legislators should
not be met. The same rule
applies.

VIC VET SAYS...

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q — Can an eligible U. S.
veteran get medical care at Veter-
an's Administration expense while
he is temporarily living in a
foreign country? If so, where
would the treatment be given?

A — He might receive out-
patient treatment or hospitaliza-
tion at VA expense by applying
at the nearest American embassy
or consulate. The medical care
might be from physicians of the
foreign country or at the nearest
United States overseas military
hospital.

Q — My NSLI term insurance
policy is becoming much more
expensive because of periodic in-
creases in premiums. I would like
to convert to permanent plan
insurance but cannot afford to
convert the entire policy. Can I
convert part of it and keep
the rest as term insurance?

A — Yes. You may convert
as little (but no less than) \$1,000
at a time to a plan with fixed
premium amounts in order to
avoid the periodic increases of
the term insurance.

Q — Will my mother's re-
marriage bar me from war or-
phan benefits?

A — No. You are still an "or-
phan" as far as being eligible
for this benefit is concerned.
Even your own marriage will
not bar you. Only your increasing
age will bar you. The customary
deadline is 23 years, but in cer-
tain instances this may be extended.

New Remote Garage Door Operator Priced for Suburban Pocketbook

DETROIT, MICH. — The re-
mote controlled garage door
operator, long considered the
exclusive property of the well-
to-do, has invaded more modest
neighborhoods.

The Berry Door Corporation,
the country's largest manufac-
turer of residential steel garage
doors, has developed a new re-
mote control operator they
claim is the lowest priced com-
plete unit on today's market.

The new garage door operator



includes a pocket-sized trans-
mitter that can be attached to
the sun visor, kept in the
glove compartment, or moved
from one car to another.

At the push of a button, its
radio signal opens the garage
door and turns on the light.
The light stays on until a clos-
ing button mounted inside or
outside the garage is pushed.
... down comes the door and
out goes the light.

The modestly priced unit
brings a host of new advan-
tages within the reach of every
family. Climbing in and out of



the car and juggling packages
and the garage door in a rain-
storm or blizzard is a thing
of the past.

There are other safety and
convenience factors with the
new unit: Heavy, creamy doors
are no longer a problem; the
courtesy light discourages
 prowlers for women, oldsters,
and children returning home
late at night.

Golf clubs, bicycles, and bar-
becue carts are safely "locked
up" in the garage with no extra
trouble whether taking quick
trips to the corner market or
extended vacations. The new re-

mote operator is keyed to the
owner's individual transmitter;
others will not operate the door.

The unit is so simple that the
home-owner can handle 90 per
cent of the maintenance with-
out tools. Installation takes but
30 minutes.

The Berry remote operator
can be installed on practically
any garage door and carries
full guarantee on all parts for
five years.
