REYES SHOWS HIS MAN PREEMINENT  
POLITICAL HAND SAYS NOTED  
SUFFRAGETTEAfter Repeated Denials He  
Will Head Opposition to  
Diaz in Coming Presidential  
Election.

Mexico City, July 24.—Gen. Bernardo Reyes, once the idol of the army, who recently upon his return from political banishment in Europe, announced that he would not be a candidate for the presidency in the forthcoming national elections, has changed his mind, and all of the politicians in the capital city now know that Madero is to have at least one candidate in opposition to his plans to become the successor of Diaz.

Confirmation of Reyes' intention came recently from a most reliable authority.

In the present confused politics of the country and the widespread disorder following the attempts Madero has made to dictate the policies of President De La Huerta, the possibility of Reyes' candidacy is a combination which will do more than prove a setback to the Maderista revolution.

Some political leaders have already begun to agitate through the press the necessity of postponing the national elections due in October for a year, because of the growing fear that the holding of the elections will turn the present widespread disorder into open anarchy.

Those who have witnessed the advent of Gen. Reyes as an opponent of Madero have already picked as his running mate for the vice presidency, R. Theodore Delmas, the present governor of Vera Cruz, a man who has always been a Diaz partisan.

This is a combination which, it is believed, will draw the hearty support of the Cientifico party, composed of those of the disbanded Diaz regime, as well as the strength of the army.

It is also generally expected that with Reyes in the field, many of his one time friends who deserted him when he fell from his high demand that he head a Diaz government in the state of Nuevo Leon and who have been Madero supporters during the interim, will return to their former loyalty.

Even before Reyes returned to Mexico, which was within three days of Diaz's departure from Vera Cruz, old Revolution clubs sprang again into being and new throughout portions of Mexico these clubs are doing open campaign work even against the implied threat of the vengeance even where of Madero troops.

Many people who have recently suffered a relapse from the hysterical acclaim with which Madero was received six weeks ago will support the candidacy of Reyes, it is believed, only because of their belief that no other candidate offering, he will make a better president than Francisco Madero.

SCOOP CATFISH OUT  
WITH SHOVELSA Fishy Story of the Great  
Rain Storm That Visited  
Carlsbad Last Monday;  
Many Horse Accidents.

Carlsbad, N. M., July 28.—Monday night the clouds burst and the rain poured down in torrents, the United States reclamation office records show that it rained 5.5 inches, the river rose ten feet and gave the new work of the government a severe test only to show that the work is solid and permanent.

The railroad men who were forced to lay over here have been catching large catfish and are having the time of their lives. They drain the water holes left by the falling of the river and just scoop the big catfish out with shovels and pitchforks.

Small damage is reported to the orchards except that some peaches were blown off the trees.

The trains that should have left here Monday morning, both north and south were detained until Tuesday morning. This is about the extent of damage occasioned by the great storm. But the good the rain did over balance the damage a hundredfold for it insured all the cotton and corn on the dry farms and makes the grass grow tall and succulent. The pastures are assured till spring and the cattle will be rolling fat.

A few days ago Lawrence Ryan, ex-road overseer, had a horse break the bones in his left hand and Saturday Arthur O'Quinn, a 16-year-old boy, and the son of the probate clerk, was thrown from his pony and badly bruised up. These accidents are enough to boost the automobile business and it is said the two accidents have taken a great many orders for autos lately.

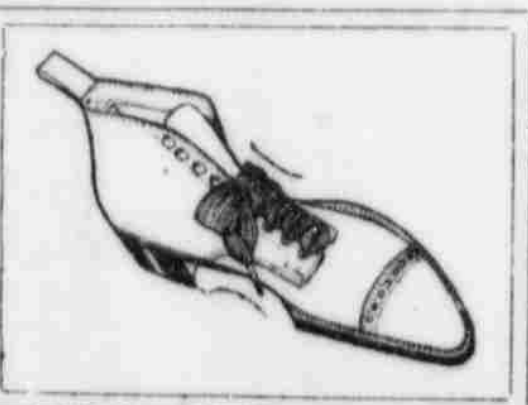
