## 150 ACRES SOLD BY ATRISCO FARMS

St. Louis Business Man Starts the Raising of Alfalfa on Good Tract South of This City.

Mr. Hornby's tract is right next the Santa Fe road, and is about five miles south of the city. It is under ditch. He expects to spend a total of \$20,000 in the purchase of the land, leveling and improving it, and in the erection of a fence post.

## TURKS SLAUGHTER BULGARIANS AT ISHTIB

Bomb Was Exploded in a Mosque There on December 4 and Rioting Comes As Revenge on Suspects.

Constantinople, Dec. 6.—Serious rioting has occurred at Ishtib, about 30 miles north of Salomik, consequent on the bomb outrage in a mosque there on December 4, when twelve persons were killed and twenty wounded. The Turks, for revenge, attacked the Bulgarians, whom they accuse of being the perpetrators of the outrage, killing fourteen and wounding 175.

## WORKMEN BURIED UNDER CONCRETE BUILDING

Three Are Known to Be Dead and Many Others Are Still in Debris of Structure Which Collapsed.

London, Dec. 6.—The Duchess of Manchester has canceled her trip to India, for the present at least, owing to the serious illness of her little daughter, Lady Consuelo Montague. The duchess last week traveled to Genoa, where she met the duke. They were about to start for Egypt when they received a telegram that their daughter was suffering from appendicitis, and an immediate operation was necessary.

The child was conveyed to a nursing home, where the operation was successfully carried out. Latest accounts say that Lady Consuelo, who is only 4 years old, is progressing satisfactorily. The Duke and Duchess of Manchester are now hurrying home to be near their child's bedside, but when convalescent the duke and duchess will journey to India, probably accompanied by Mrs. Leeds.

## BASKETBALL TEAM PUT OUT BY COLLEGE

After more than a week of practice, and with two weeks yet to play before their first game, the basketball squad from the Albuquerque Business college is rounding into splendid shape and will be one of the factors to be reckoned with in deciding local championships this fall.

## The Markets

### SPECULATION IS NOT VERY ACTIVE

Fluctuations of Stocks Were Unusually Narrow Among the Standard Issues on Wall Street Today.

New York, Dec. 6.—Slow, dragging movements of stocks during the morning reflected the continued absence of speculative interest. Fluctuations of stocks were unusually narrow among the standard issues. There was some further pressure against the Wabash securities on account of the uncertainty of the outcome of the reorganization proceedings. Prices took an upward turn again after 11 o'clock, although there was scattered speculation in some of the low-priced railroads and specialties. American Tobacco preferred rose 2 1/4. The preferred and common stocks of the Wabash securities and they rallied briskly. The preferred sold 1 1/8 and the four 1 1/8 above yesterday's closing.

Bonds were easy.

Lehigh Valley was taken in hand after midday and suddenly rushed up to 1 1/8, a gain of 1 3/4. Reading moved in sympathy to the extent of a point, but the rest of the market was almost motionless. A break of 1 1/4 later on Northern Pacific and some profit taking in the callers also were without marked effect on other stocks.

Leading stocks were neglected. Some interest was excited by the forced liquidation of various obscure issues. Allis Chalmers stocks and bonds were affected by rumors of a coming reorganization of the company. The common stocks sold at 2 1/2, the preferred 2 1/2 and the 5 per cent bonds at 32 1/2, which were about the lowest figures ever reached. Federal Mining preferred slumped 7 points to 28 and Toledo, St. Louis & Western preferred yielded 2 3/4. The close was weak.
