## NEW MINISTER OF CHINA IS DUE TO ARRIVE APRIL 17

**K. F. Shah, First Diplomatic Representative of New Chinese Republic Is One of the Modern School.**

(By Leased Wire to Evening Herald.) Washington, April 9.—A new Chinese minister to the United States, Mr. K. F. Shah, one of the products of the new regime of China, will arrive in this country next week. The American minister at Peking, Paul S. Reinsch, sends word that Mr. Shah left Peking with his family on March 2, traveling by way of Siberia, expecting to reach New York by the steamer Amerika, due April 17, and come to Washington for the minister's presentation to President Wilson. Mr. Shah will be the first minister under the new republic of China, recently recognized by the American government.

## COUNTY TREASURY OFFICE WILL BE UP TO DATE

**Famous Dayton City Manager Will Send Information Concerning Latest Methods of Financial Accounting.**

In a few days the county treasurer's office will have the last word in efficiency in the methods of financial accounting as practiced in the modern municipality under scientific management. This information is promised by H. M. Waite, city manager of Dayton, Ohio. Mr. Waite is filling the position offered to Colonel Goethals, the builder of the Panama canal.

Dayton offered the position of city manager at an impressive salary to Colonel Goethals a few days before Mayor Mitchell of New York tried to secure the famous exponent of applied scientific management and high-power efficiency as police commissioner for the metropolis, and the two offers spurred President Wilson to name him general governor of the canal zone and to urge congress to raise his rank.

The publicity attendant on the Dayton offer attracted the attention of Deputy County Treasurer Matt Rippel to the fact that Dayton stands for the last word in scientific efficiency in all departments of municipal government, and Mr. Rippel's professional curiosity was aroused. He is a close student of municipal accounting systems, as well as of taxation and co-related subjects, and he lost no time in writing to City Manager Waite. He wanted to know how accounting control was handled in the model city of Ohio.

## Modern Hyde Gets Eighteen Years in Sing Sing

**Edward Mendel was Respected Merchant in New Jersey by Day and Merciless Thug in New York by Night**

(By Leased Wire to Evening Herald.) New York, April 9.—Edward Mendel, a modern Jekyll-Hyde who was a respected iron and steel merchant in Newark, N. J., and a thug in New York by night, was today sentenced to spend eighteen years in Sing Sing prison.

Mendel, who in Newark was a member of many fraternal orders and clubs, lured Mrs. Pauline Koetsel to an upper west side freight yard in New York and there tore her diamond earrings from her ears. He was captured as he was running away from the yard.

In court later three other women identified him as the thug who had similarly assaulted and robbed them.

Many letters and petitions from New York clubs and associations came to the judge who sentenced Mendel. All these insisted some mistake had been made.

## BRYAN ADVISED OF SIGNING OF NEW COLUMBIAN TREATY

(By Leased Wire to Evening Herald.) Washington, April 9.—Secretary Bryan received official notification from Minister Thompson at Bogota today of the signing of the new treaty with Colombia to settle the long-standing

dispute over the partition of Panama.

A cash payment of \$25,000,000 by the United States to Colombia is the principal feature. The official plan is to publish the details later by arrangement with the foreign office at Bogota.

President Wilson told cabinet members that while he had not yet been informed in detail about the new treaty with Colombia, there was nothing in it expressing any matter of apology by the United States in connection with the partition of the canal strip.

## Chairman Eldest to Talk

Washington, April 9.—Chairman Elliott of the New Haven railroad, is expected at the department of justice tomorrow to discuss the personnel of the boards of trustees which are to take over the Illinois land and Connecticut trolley systems now owned by the New Haven.

The Rev. W. B. Hill of Poughkeepsie, N. Y., a son-in-law of Weyerhaeuser, assisted at the services.
