

### CITY WILL MOVE INTO NEW HALL THIS WEEK

Doors, Only Equipment Lacking for 1st Floor, Received Today; New Year's Leave May Be Held.

Assurance that all the city departments and officials will be housed in the new city hall by the first of the year was established today by the arrival of the oak doors for the different rooms. They were all that the first floor lacked of preparedness for occupancy.

It will take about two days to hang the doors, according to City Engineer James N. Gladding, so that the police, the mayor, the city clerk and the city engineer's force, all those now remaining in the temporary quarters in the Korber building, should be installed in the new building by Thursday. The fire department has been in the city hall for some time.

It is not unlikely that there will be an "open house" at the new structure New Year's day for the benefit of the citizens who have not yet had an opportunity of inspecting the interior of the big building. Mayor Boatright is considering the idea, and if it is decided to hold a New Year's levee in the hall announcement will be made in due time.

### 'WEALTHY COWMAN' ADMITS CHECKS WERE BAD

Cornelius McReavy Walked to Isleta After Spending \$20 He Bilked from Stevens and Farr; Gave \$5 Tips.

Cornelius McReavy, of Salt Lake City, who posed as a wealthy cattleman, acknowledged to Judge George Craig in the police court this morning that two checks he passed in this city last week were spurious. He was arrested Saturday after disappearing from the city, at Isleta. Each of the two bad checks was for \$10. One was given to Ed Farr and the other to Sam Stevens, of the Surges hotel. William Phillips, who witnessed the passing of the check from McReavy to Stevens, swore to a complaint against the prisoner this morning.

McReavy came to the city in company with Leo Taylor, a cattleman. He borrowed \$50 from Taylor, whom he met on the train on the way from Salt Lake City, and handed out \$5 tips to the porters. He left his new found friends in this city Saturday morning after passing the checks, saying he would return in a short time. He didn't come back and they grew suspicious. Complaint to the police followed, and Chief McMillin, who had heard of "wealthy cattlemen" with check-passing habits before, advised that McReavy had headed for Isleta about to "jump" a train. He sent a J. McKew, special agent of the Santa Fe at Isleta, and Saturday evening McKew caught McReavy as he entered town. He had \$5 cents in his pockets. McReavy will be arrested for sentence this afternoon.

### Boy Bicyclist Is Bowled Over by Ilfeld Car

Peter Matteucci Tries to Cross Before Auto at Central and Second and Smash-Up Follows.

Peter Matteucci, 12-year-old son of P. Matteucci, was struck by Nea Ilfeld's automobile at Central and Second and crashed this afternoon. According to eyewitnesses the fault was the boy's. He did not seem to see much harm.

The boy was riding a bicycle, going west on Central avenue. The automobile, traveling in the same direction, was abreast of him. At the second street corner Matteucci, according to eyewitnesses, put on speed and attempted to turn by crossing before the car. The crash followed.

Matteucci was taken into R. Ruppel's drug store, where Dr. C. A. Frana examined him. The physician said he did not appear to be seriously injured, but said he could not give a definite opinion until several hours had passed.

Mr. Ilfeld carried the boy and the physician to the former's home in his car.

### PORFILLIO SAVEDRA NAMES HEARING AND IS HELD

Prominent San Josean Awaits Action of Grand Jury on Charge That He Received Stolen Goods.

Porfillio Savedra, accused of receiving stolen goods, waived examination before Justice of the Peace George R. Craig this morning and furnished \$5000 bail for his appearance before the grand jury. According to the county police, Special Agent George R. Thomas and Station Master Ed Simpson of the Santa Fe found at Savedra's house in San Jose a great quantity of things stolen from freight cars. The lot is said to have included cases of coffee, pairs of candy, suits of goods, overalls, socks, stove blacking, a big leather belt and other things.

Savedra is prominent politically in San Jose, and his family is widely known. He was a deputy sheriff and much looked up to by the people of his neighborhood. In his house, according to the authorities, is a secret room in which he stored the alleged stolen things. It is entered through a door from an inner room and is entirely windowless. From the outside the existence of the room, it is said, is not to be detected or suspected.

### MUST REFORM RULES DECLARES ATHLETIC RESEARCH PRESIDENT

Chicago, Dec. 28.—"Amateurism must be defined in definite instead of negative terms and amateurism must be thoroughly understood by the athletes and the public as well, if amateur athletics is to thrive," declared Wilbur P. Bowen of the Michigan State Normal college, today in his address to the Athletic Research society.

The meeting which preceded the convention of the National Collegiate Athletic association, which opens tomorrow, was largely devoted to the subject of amateurism. "In some quarters," said President Bowen, "amateurism is looked upon as petty insistence on details to the extent of injuring sport."

Discussing the college practice of scouting or recruiting athletes, Mr. Bowen said that in the east athletes are recruited without the knowledge of the school authorities. "In the west," he said, "the practice is sometimes open or with tacit approval."

"An amateur athlete is one who participates in competitive physical sports only for the pleasure and physical, mental, moral and social benefits directly derived therefrom." This definition was offered to the Athletic Research society by a committee which since 1911 has considered the exact meaning of the work amateur.

The report presented by John Brown, Jr., of New York, listed three ways in which an athlete might be recruited by a coach. First, by teaching or coaching professional athletes for pay, second, by competing under salary of for a fee, and third, by convincing for a cash prize or for a stake bet.

A middle position for those not strictly professional athletes was suggested by the committee which classes as "non-competing amateurs," those who have maintained their status as amateurs except having been engaged for pay as instructors in amateur athletics. Coaches in high schools, colleges, clubs and M. C. C. play grounds, were classed under the head "non-competing amateurs," by the committee.

### HONDURANIAN CONSUL IS ARRESTED, CHARGED WITH FIRING HOUSE

San Francisco, Dec. 28.—Fernando Zamora Vitaa, consul general here of the republic of Honduras, was arrested today and booked on a charge of arson. He had been under surveillance by the police since last night, when firemen found that his burning house had been liberally sprinkled with oil and turpentine.

Bureau drawers in the bedroom were found filled with paper saturated in oil; carpets had been sprinkled with inflammables; holes had been cut through the ceilings of closets for fuses, and streamers tied from the rafters to guide the flames. The Vitaa was found partially clad on the sidewalk shortly after the firemen arrived. At police headquarters he asserted that his consular position as the representative of a foreign nation made him immune from prosecution.

### STATE FEDERATION MAKES KNOWN ITS LEGAL DESIRES

Legislative Chairman Announces Women's Clubs Want Amended Property Rights and Other Advances

The chairman of the legislative section of the State Federation of Women's Clubs has announced the desires of the federation with regard to proposed legislation at the coming session of the state lawmaking body, included in the desires of the federation are amended and broader property rights for unmarried women, state libraries in rural sections, to afford cultural advantages to the citizens, and the spacing of women on all of the state boards.

The desired laws are outlined as follows by Donna H. Landay, the legislative chairman. First, That the community property rights of the wife be the same as those of the husband, that is, that the property acquired after marriage, shall belong to the wife as much as to the husband, and that it will require her signature to make a legal deed or mortgage.

The law now reads "The husband has absolute control of the community property and may mortgage or sell it without the consent of his wife, with the exception of the homestead and its furnishings."

It is plain by the reading that "the wife is discriminated against. In some instances real estate has been transferred against the admission and desires of the wife; in others, she has known nothing of the transaction until after the death of her husband, in case of divorce she has been granted a mere allowance of the estate, which has been accumulated by them jointly, surely the mother of children should have added security rather than added insecurity. She should be able by law to know whether the accumulated property is intact or not, she would know if she were an equal partner and wife, required to sign the deed. The men who make the laws of New Mexico should not want the women of the state to see and read this unjust law as they do."

Second, This federation would like to see a law passed which would place women on all of the state boards, educational, charitable and reformatory. We think that a woman's hand and heart should be mollified into the making of our state institutions. That without it so, it shows the ignorance, as much as a teacher's appointment does that of a woman's hand. That if we send our daughters to state schools, we should have a part in moulding the curriculum and general management. That the reform school is peopled from homes largely where there has been no mother influence, and that the prison—a jail inside which are calling for a woman's ready quite as much.

Third, That the county commissioners very much need books and magazines that a state provision for our outlying communities, whereby straggling settlers can have the use of books to gladden life and make it worth living, should be provided. These provisions have been considered into the making of the federation for several years, and it seems but reasonable that the pulse of the state as found by this federation should be considered, not only "seriously," but should be remedied, and the social reform work be given a prominent place in the new laws created.

### BIOGRAPH PEOPLE TO GO THROUGH CITY SOON

Special Train Carrying the Troupes to Winter Quarters Largest Ever Used for Motion Picture Concern.

The Biograph company, well known to all motion picture fans, will pass through the city soon on its way from Hoboken, N. J., to winter quarters in Los Angeles. The company, which includes seven acting "companies," will utilize a train of twelve steel cars for the trip, many of them baggage cars loaded with costumes, scenery and properties. There are more than 125 people in the companies which will make the trip. The start from Hoboken will be on December 28. It is likely that weather and light conditions permitting, the different companies will stage a few scenes here on their way west, as they have done this on some of the trips in former years.

### STREET FORCE IS LAYING CROSSINGS THROUGHOUT CITY

As rapidly as the force can work, crossings are being laid by the street department across the sloppy thoroughfare. The lowlands of this city are as flat as a board, with dirt streets and no storm sewers; we have had two extraordinary snowfalls with 14 inches of rain in between, within two weeks, and about two days of sunshine since the first fall of snow. How can the streets be anything but muddy, and what can the street department do except throw dirt or ash on the crossings as fast as possible? That is being done."
