**New York Stock Market.**  
New York, Sept. 11.—Light trading with a lower price tendency featured today's brief market session. Inferences growing out of the foreign situation helped to restrain bullish enthusiasm, even though other news was of a constructive character. Bank clearings offered further proof of business improvement and steel mills were reported as refusing additional orders, having reached the limit of capacity. The movement of stocks was narrow for the most part; war shares, however, showing decided declines from yesterday. United States steel was under pressure, falling a point to 13 3/4, its low figure of the week, and railroad shares were disposed to yield a point or thereabouts. The closing was heavy. Bonds were irregular.

**Chicago Board of Trade.**  
Chicago, Sept. 11.—Wheat made a fresh jump today in consequence of further rains and because of predictions of additional shipments all over the domestic field before Monday opening prices, which ranged from the same as last night to 3 1/2 up, with September at 95 1/2 to 1.00 and December at 94 to 94 1/2, were followed by a quick general advance which in some cases amounted to 2 1/2. This close was weak at the same as last night to one cent higher, with September at 93 1/2 and December at 95.

Corn hardened with wheat and as a result of unfavorable weather. After opening to a shade lower to 3 1/2 advance, the market secured a moderate rise all around. The close was unsettled at 5 1/2 to 5 3/4 advance, compared with last night.

Oats reflected the strength of other grain. Selling was only of a scattered sort.

Not much activity was shown in provisions. The market averaged a little higher on account of the bulk in the price of cereals.
