LAS VEGAS 'Y AN ACTIVE FACTOR IN LIFE OF THE TOWN

Las Vegas, N. M., Jan. 13.—Reports read at the annual meeting of members of the local Young Men's Christian Association show how active a part the association has been playing in the social affairs of the town.

In the physical department, 4,013 boys and 2,914 men have used the privileges during the year, which is a low figure because of the many miscellaneous users of privileges. The membership has increased during the year from 239 to 266. Financially the association is in better shape, liabilities on January 1 amounting to \$8,376.56, of which \$8,200 is covered by a mortgage on the building.

The tennis course has merit the patronage of a large number of people, and seems to have come to stay. Last summer the tennis court was a successful proposition and will be enlarged during 1916.

SMOKE HELMET FOR RATON FIRE BOYS

Batum, Jan. 13.—By securing a smoke helmet for the Raton fire department it is believed that loss of property and life can be avoided in Raton. Upon its receipt at the fire department the new helmet was given a try-out in Hobbs hardware powder house near the city. The demonstration proved a great success. Equipped with this new helmet the local firemen will now be able to enter any building or cellar filled with dense smoke and work for three or four hours at a stretch. The new equipment will be of inestimable value to the department in the saving of life or in fighting fire under great handicap from smoke.

ers who have engaged in this line, and the possibility of other paying crops was taken up at the meeting of business men called by R. P. Porter. At this meeting \$1,300 was subscribed to finance the experiments. It was definitely determined at this meeting that sugar beets and cotton promised well for this section, and proper committees were selected to investigate these crops. The cotton experiments are well under way and this season will determine what may be done under commercial conditions here with this crop. But the beet proposition has already assumed proportions beyond all expectations. An enthusiastic meeting of business men was held under the auspices of the water users' publicity department, and additional committees were appointed, and funds solicited for sugarbeet experiments. After a conference with President Ladd and Director Garcia the college agreed to co-operate with the farmers in the experiment, both from a commercial and scientific standpoint, and to lend every aid possible along the lines needed by the farmers of this section.

1,000 STRAY BURROS BRING 25 CENTS EACH

Hillsboro, Jan. 13.—The 1,000 stray burros which the Sierra county authorities have been advertising for some time have been purchased by Al Sheppard at a price of 25 cents each. However, as the work of gathering the burros from various sections of the county is yet to be done, the cost to the purchaser will be somewhat greater before his holdings become a "commercial asset."

FARMINGTON PAPER CHANGES OWNERSHIP

Farmington, N. M., Jan. 13.—The Farmington Enterprise for many years one of the best known papers in the state, under the ownership of Frank Stainback and the management of Orval Blackett, has been sold. Bierly and Braze are the new owners.

No statement has been made of what the policy of the paper will be in future.

ROOSEVELT COUNTY HAS HIGH PER CENT ATTENDING SCHOOL

Portales, N. M., Jan. 13.—The report of the county school superintendent, forwarded recently to the state department of education in Santa Fe, shows a high proportion of those of school age in the county enrolled in its schools. The school census is 2,419; the enrollment 2,284.

The average annual salary to the thirty-four men teachers is \$150.66, that of the fifty-two women \$389.26.

School property in the county is valued at \$48,175 and the school expenditures last year were only about \$2,000 less than this figure. The average term is 7.67 months, though Portales and Elida, the incorporated districts, held nine-months schools.

MEXICAN OFFICIAL INVESTS IN NEW MEXICO

Silver City, N. M., Jan. 13.—A deal is pending here regarding the sale of a block of stock in the Silver Cell Mining company to Hilario Losoya, ex-governor of the state of Durango, Mexico. Representatives are on the ground and a meeting is scheduled here this week, possibly Thursday, when the deal may be finally settled. At present there are about twenty men employed and it is stated that thirty additional men will be put on by the first of the month. It is understood that the money received in the sale will be used in prosecuting development work on the property.

EKLUND SALOON IN CLAYTON IS CLOSED

Clayton, N. M., Jan. 13.—The Eklund saloon here was closed Tuesday night, at the instance, it is said, of the county commissioners and district attorney. Irregularities, especially the sale of liquor to minors, are said to be the cause.

SILVER CITY MASON'S MAY ERECT BUILDING

Silver City, N. M., Jan. 13.—Silver City Masons are considering the erection of a handsome business block on lots owned by them at the corner of Bullard and Market streets, fronting on Bullard. The Masons have a half block, and the building, if erected, would probably be three stories in

height, making it the largest structure of its kind in the city.

According to plans under consideration, the building would be of brick with store rooms on the ground floor and lecture hall on the third floor.

The Masonic lots at one time were optioned by the Silver City Hotel company, which proposed to build thereon a \$100,000 hotel, but this company failed to put through its plans and the property reverted to the Masons. This hotel company had no connection with the men now interested in the building of a modern tourist and commercial hotel in this city.
