Chicago, Sept. 11.—General belief that frost had done but little damage led to a downturn in the value of corn today after a wavering start. Heats stilling took place. Bearish sentiment was further emphasized by forecasts of rising temperatures. Opening price, which ranged from \$1 lower to 1¢ advance, with December at \$1.15 1/2, \$1.20 and May at \$1.16 1/2 to \$1.17 1/2, were followed by a mixture of setback all around.

Foreign speculators who bought late yesterday, fearing frost damage, were said to have been among the chief sellers today. The close was from 1/2 to 1 1/2 cents not lower, at \$1.17 1/2 to \$1.18 December and \$1.15 1/2 to \$1.15 1/2 May.

Sete gave way with corn.

Arrivals of wheat continued meager. There were sales from millers for money more than was available.

Wheat was received that Canada had fixed \$7.20 as a maximum price to correspond with the government standard in the United States.

SALE OF INDIAN TIMBER IN ARIZONA.

SEALING BILLS FOR THE PURCHASE of timber from the White Mountain Apache Indian Reservation in East-Central Arizona will be received at Washington, D. C., until 12 o'clock noon eastern time, Wednesday, October 24, 1917. The sale embraces approximately four-hundred-million feet of timber, about ninety-five per cent western yellow pine. No bid of less than three dollars per thousand board measure for all timber cut prior to October 1, 1924, will be considered. Prices subsequent to that date will be fixed by the Commissioner of Indian Affairs in accordance with operating and market conditions.

The Department of Agriculture has advertised a tract adjacent to the Indian Reservation containing approximately two hundred and thirty-five million feet of yellow pine. This timber can be logged in connection with the Indian timber.
