

TOO MUCH RAIN FOR THE CROPS.

Unfavorable Conditions
Have Generally Pre-
vailed.

BETTER IN WESTERN DIS-
TRICT.

Present Condition of Crops: Cotton:
76; Corn 84; Tobacco 87.

The reports of correspondents of the weekly weather crops bulletin issued by the North Carolina experiment station and State weather service, for the week ending Friday July 31st, 1891, show that unfavorable conditions have generally prevailed. The weather has continued cool, and cloudy with constant rains, interrupting farm work, and giving grass another start. In the Western District, however, the weather has been warmer and the rainfall not so heavy, these conditions causing a considerable improvement of crops in that district. Cotton is growing too rankly, and not fruiting well. A continuation of rainy weather will cause shedding and rust. Some complaint of tobacco frenching. Present condition of crops: Cotton, 76; corn, 84; tobacco, 87.

The following total rainfalls for the week have been reported: Weldon, 1.03; Wilmington, 2.54; Gibson, 1.50; Smithfield, 3.20; Godwin, 2.75; Asheville, 1.00; Salisbury, 6.78; Oak Ridge, 1.61; Raleigh, 1.90.

(163 reports received representing 67 counties.)

EASTERN DISTRICT.

There has been too much rainy and cloudy weather during the past week, which combined with a deficiency temperature has been unfavorable for all crops. Cotton is not fruiting well, and if rainy weather continues is likely to shed its blooms. Grass is making headway again. Condition of cotton has decreased two per cent. Corn is about the same, while tobacco has slightly improved. Present condition of crops: cotton 77; corn 82; tobacco 86; grass 89; peanuts 84; potatoes 86. (50 reports received representing 22 counties.)

CENTRAL DISTRICT.

Decidedly unfavorable conditions have generally prevailed in this district. Cloudy, cold and wet weather is causing cotton to grow rankly, and it is not fruiting well, already slightly affected with rust, and blooms dropping in a few places. Corn and tobacco will suffer if the rains continue. Farm work is at a stand still and crops are becoming grassy. A hail storm destroyed crops in Stokes county to an estimated value of forty thousand dollars. Condition of crops: Cotton 75; corn 84; tobacco 85.

(Fifty-three reports received representing twenty-two counties.)

WESTERN DISTRICT.

The weather in this district has generally been quite favorable in many places. The rain-fall, though excessive in some places, has not been so continuous as in other portions of the State. Warmer weather and sunshine prevailed. Crops consequently show considerable improvement as compared with last week. Present condition of crops: Cotton, 76; corn, 87; tobacco, 90. This is an improvement of 4 per cent. for cotton, and 3 per cent. for tobacco.

Cotton, though late is quite large and able to bear a fair crops. (60 reports received representing 23 counties.)

EXPLANATION.

Condition of crops, stated on basis of 100.

Best condition is 100. Excellent condition is 90 to 100. Good condition is 80 to 90. Fair condition is 70 to 80. Poor condition is under 70.

bonds and consists of one hundred

bonds of the denomination of \$100 each.

These bonds are issued by virtue of

an act of the General Assembly of

North Carolina, ratified on March 3,

1891.

The bonds are payable July 1, 1901,

with the privilege reserved to the

County Commissioners of Cleveland to

purchase annually one-tenth of the en-

tire issue of said bonds at a sum not ex-

ceeding their par value and in case no

one offers to sell one tenth of said

bonds at par, then the commissioners

are authorized to designate such bonds

not exceeding one-tenth of the whole

number issued as they may desire to

purchase, and after the designation of

said bonds and due notice thereof

given, if the holder of the bonds shall

refuse to surrender the same and re-

ceive their par value with interest ac-

crued, then holders shall not receive

any interest subsequently accruing.

Said bonds draw 6 per cent. interest,

payable semi-annually on January 1

and July 1 of each year. None of said

bonds will be sold for less than par.

Said bonds will be sold privately and

in lots to suit the purchaser. Copy of
