COUNCIL HAS BUSY WEEK.

Several Sessions Held at Which Various Interesting Questions Were Discussed and Acted Upon.

At the regular meeting of the City Council Monday evening two bills were passed, the pay roll of the street gang amounting to \$82.25 and John Myers' salary bill of \$10.00, being his compensation for services as night policeman.

A resolution was introduced from the Board of Trade asking the council to look into the proposition of Adam Schantz to install a system of waterworks.

The sanitary inspector submitted a very comprehensive report brim full of good suggestions for the welfare of the city. The report was referred to the Sanitary Committee.

Alderman Clark, of the Street Committee, reported that C. A. Ballough had dredged a channel at the foot of Bay street and was throwing out shell for use on the streets.

A motion was again adopted requiring councilmen to stand when addressing the chair. A similar motion is passed about once a year.

The committee appointed to secure a fire bell asked for further time.

The Ordinance Committee was granted further time on the proposed ordinance making the building of cement sidewalks compulsory.

A police ordinance was passed on first and second readings. It provides for the appointment of police officers and requires the "cops" to wear blue uniforms with brass buttons and to carry a club.

The electric light ordinance was passed at this meeting, granting to Adam Schantz a twenty-year franchise. Mayor Seaman refused to approve the ordinance, however, owing to irregularities in the manner of passing same, and the council held a special session Tuesday afternoon when the matter was again taken up. The action of Monday night was reconsidered and an amendment making the franchise for thirty years instead of twenty on condition that the grantee shall install a system of waterworks was adopted. Alderman Joseph Osborne most strenuously objected to the amendment and voted against it and stated that he would vote against the final passage of the ordinance. He stated, however, that he had sent for Attorney J. M. Barrs, of Jacksonville, and if that gentleman said the amendment was all right he would not oppose it. So at this stage of the proceeding the council adjourned until Wednesday evening.

Mr. Barrs arrived Wednesday afternoon and conferred with the council on ordinances generally. He modified the electric light ordinance in minor respects and it unanimously passed and is published in the Gazette-News today.

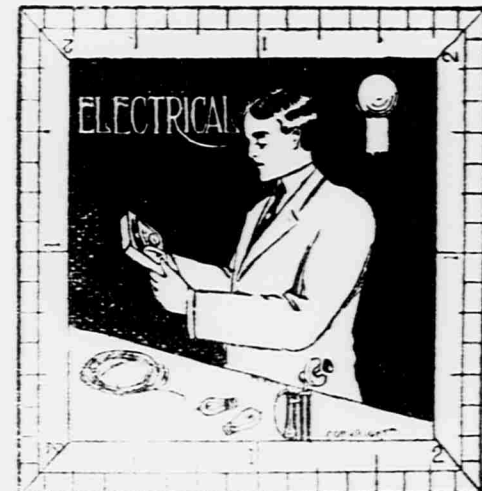

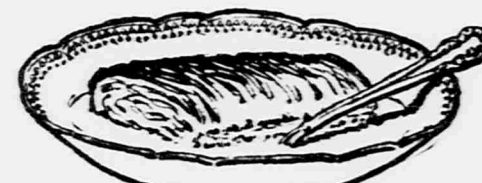
